

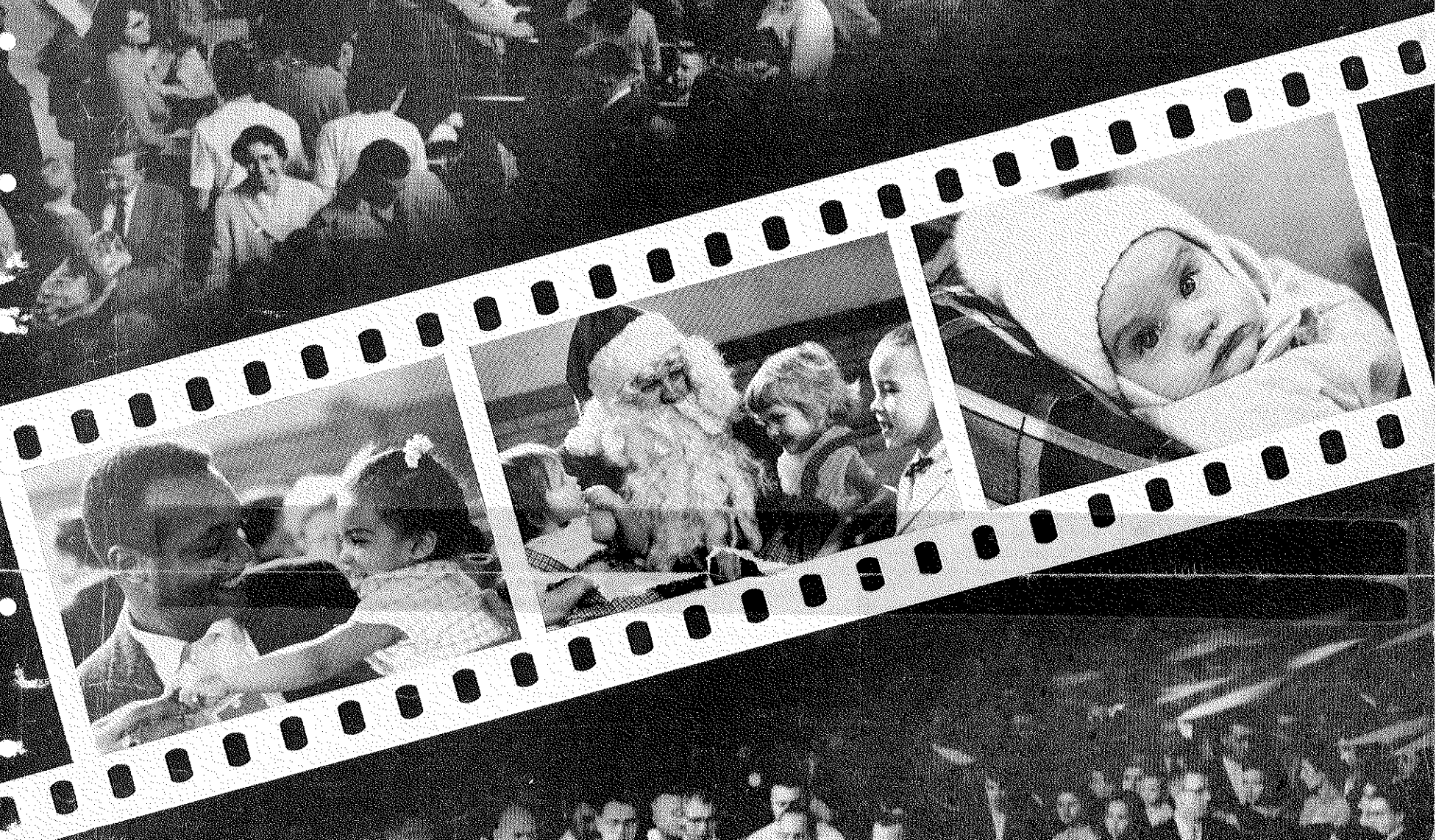

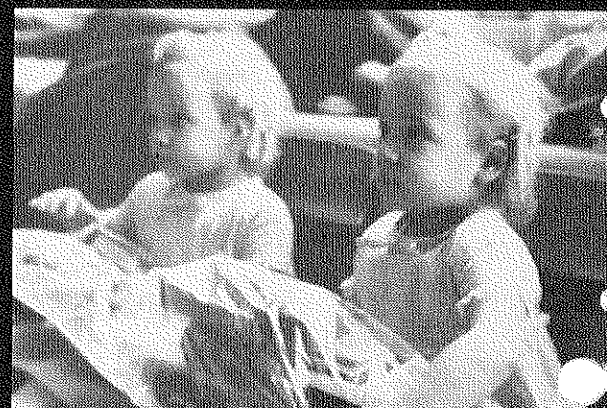
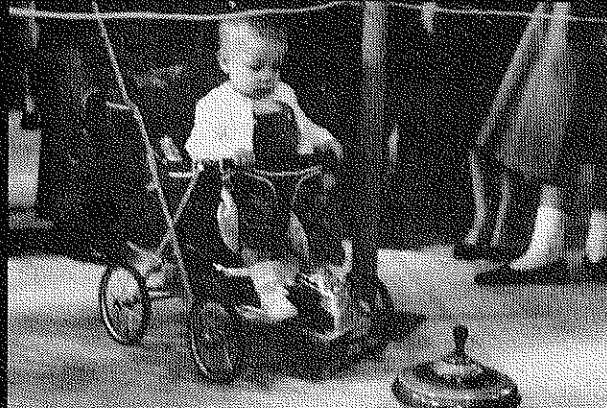

Review of Labor Relations

Local 10-689, OCAW, AFL-CIO, has requested that the Company, in accordance with Article III of the labor agreement, to withhold monthly dues in the amount of \$6.00 for the months of February, March, April, and May from members of Local 10-689, who have voluntary check-off authorizations on February 1, 1960. Monthly dues will revert to \$4.00 beginning June 1, 1960, according to a Union letter dated December 23, 1959.

NEXT BLOODMOBILE VISIT SCHEDULED JANUARY 11-12

Goodyear Atomic employees, who responded so generously when the Huntington Regional Bloodmobile visited plant site last July, are again asked, on January 11 and 12, to donate the life-giving fluid to stock the GAT blood-bank. Blood stored in the blood-bank is made available to GAT employees and members of their immediate families when needed. In July, 276 plant site employees donated a pint of blood. It is hoped that the number of donors will exceed those of July when the Bloodmobile makes its semi-annual visit next week.

The Bloodmobile will have its equipment set up, as usual, in the fire station, on January 11 and 12. Prospective donors will be assigned a date and time to give blood. The donor list is compiled beforehand from a voluntary donor list on file in the community relations department, of those employees who did not give blood at the Bloodmobile's last visit. However, walk-in donors are always welcome.

Many Goodyear Atomic employees know of someone — a relative, friend, or acquaintance — who owes his or her life to the miracle of blood transfusion. Giving blood is a simple procedure. A pint of blood doesn't seem very important, but those who have been on the receiv-

ing end fully realize its importance.

In the 13 visits to Goodyear Atomic Corporation by the Huntington Regional Bloodmobile, our employees have donated 2,917 pints of blood, a record of which to be proud.

The Bloodmobile's visit is conducted under the jurisdiction of the Pike County Chapter, American Red Cross.

On January 11, the blood collections will begin at 8:30 a. m. and conclude at 2:30 p. m. On January 12, blood donors are scheduled between the hours of 8:00 a. m. and 2:00 p. m.

When an employee is notified of his Bloodmobile appointment, the community relations department assumes that the appointment will be kept. If the appointment cannot be kept, the employee is requested to telephone 2514 for a new appointment or postpone his donation. It is important that a continuous flow of donors be scheduled throughout the day. Make every effort to KEEP YOUR BLOODMOBILE APPOINTMENT.

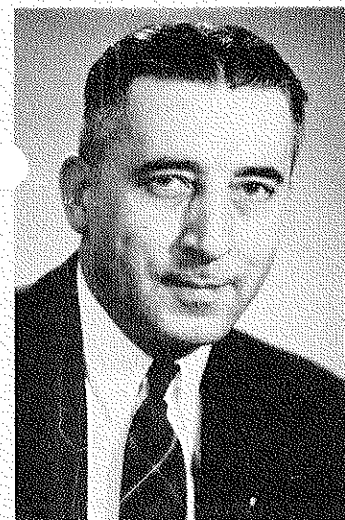
Homan Assigned To Goodyear International; Markley Promoted

Dr. Paul F. Bliss, community relations coordinator, spoke last week at the 18th Ecumenical Student Conference which was held at Ohio University, Athens.

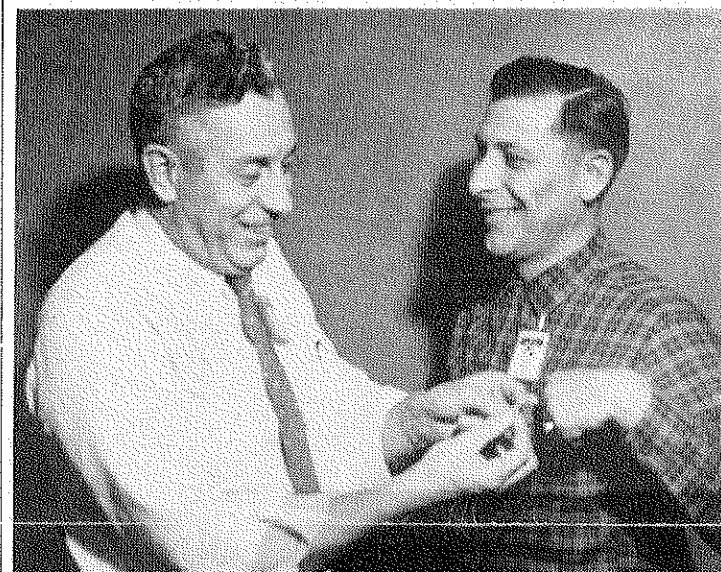

Better Check

The Employee's Withholding Exemption Certificate (Federal Income Tax Form W-4) is used by the Company to determine the amount of income tax to deduct from each employee's earnings. If your dependency exemptions have changed because of marriage, divorce, birth, death or other reasons, you may make exemption changes on Form W-4 by contacting the timekeeping & payroll department, X-100 building.

Withholding exemptions should not exceed the number to which you are legally entitled, but you may reduce or omit exemption claims for the purpose of increasing your withholding to an amount nearer your correct income tax.

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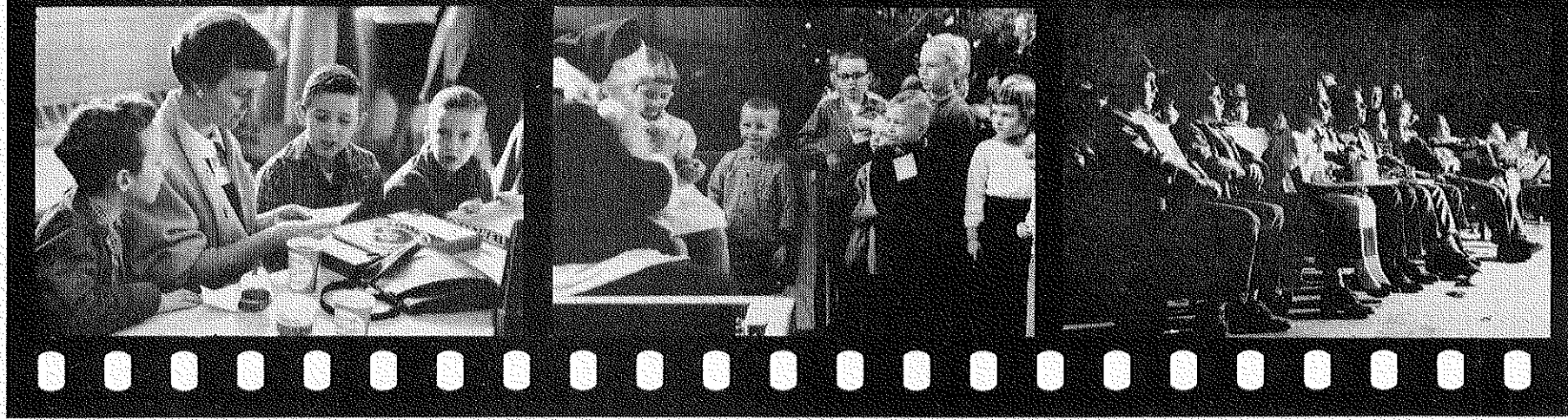

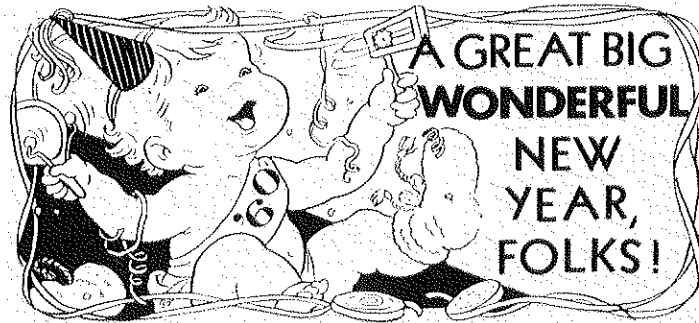
