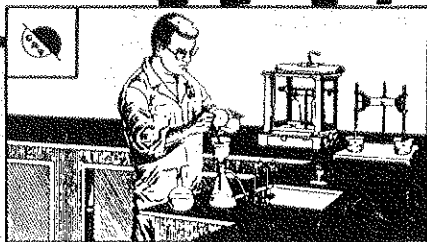

Review of Labor Relations

The following grievances were heard by Arbitrator Paul H. Sanders February 1, 1960, and the Awards made March 23, 1960.

GRIEVANCE III-109-57: The two aggrieved employees were directed not to work on two of the days normally called for under the schedule applicable to their group and were directed to work on the weekend instead. This resulted in junior employees in the same department working on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of the week in question while the grievants' work included Saturday and Sunday work at no additional pay. The grievance charged a violation of Article VIII, Section 10, as well as the general job preference seniority concept of Article VIII and the existing seniority practices in the departments.

DISCUSSION: The Arbitrator stated the Union failed to show that the rights asserted are defined under the terms of the Contract or under some uniform past practice indicating the mutual intention of the parties. Article X, Section 16, is inconsistent with the idea of a required rigid adherence to the employees' working schedule which results from the realignment provided for in Article VIII, Section 10. While other portions of Article VIII spell out in considerable detail occasions when seniority rights are controlling, the Arbitrator pointed out there is nothing

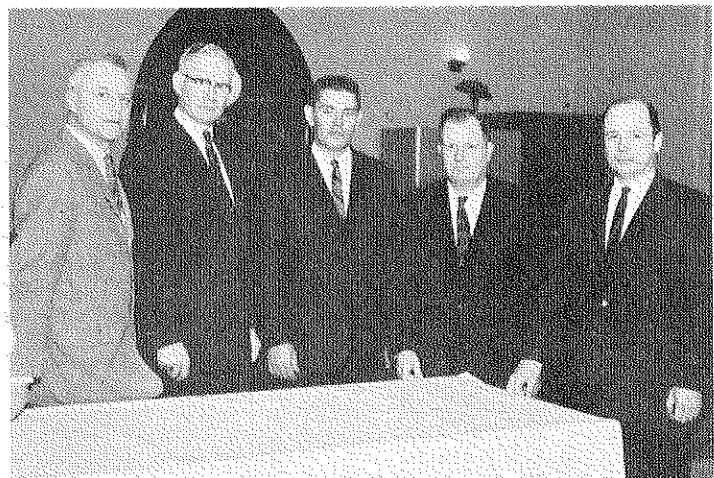
specifically relating to the particular point of this case. He suggested it could be found in the Contract only on the assumption that the reference to "realignment" in Section 10 of Article VIII embodies it. The Arbitrator was not persuaded that the record in this case would justify reading the specific rights asserted by the Union into any such generalized terms.

AWARD: Grievance denied.

GRIEVANCE III-110-57: The Union charged a violation of Article XV, Section 1 (a), when the Company discontinued the storage of dispensary supplies in the warehouse and transferred them to the hospital, except for sixteen items.

DISCUSSION: The Arbitrator said the record was clear that a substantial reduction in the inventory of hospital supplies was put into effect by the Company and that a reasonable basis was shown for the elimination of duplication in the storage of the hospital supplies involved in this grievance. The Arbitrator believes that the Company has in good faith eliminated a bargaining unit function rather than transferred that function to someone outside of the unit. The duties now performed by hospital personnel are identical with duties that were performed previous to the change. There

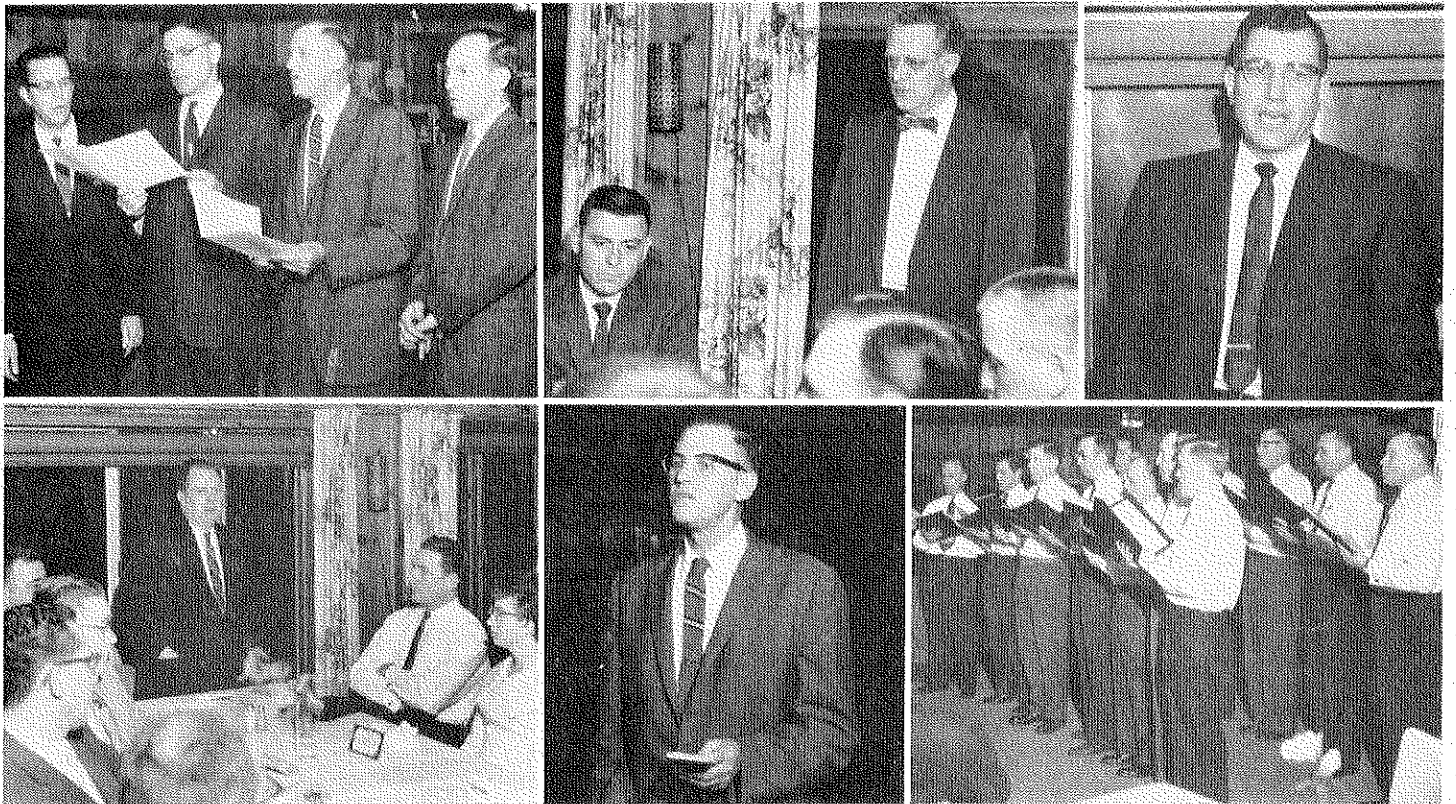

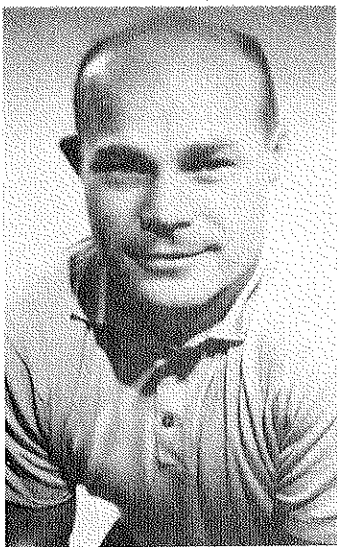
Al Nelson & Eileen Ward Are 1960 Company Bowling Champions

Al Nelson, utilities maintenance department, is GAT's Bowling Champion for the current year.

Following the nine games required to compete in the team, doubles & singles events, GAT bowlers had the opportunity to bowl six more games at the Jolly Lanes in Jackson to qualify for the Company Championship. Only scratch scores were counted.

In the GAT bowling league last Thursday, Al qualified for the ABC's triplicate patch with three identical scores of 221.

This is the highest triplicate score ever bowled in City Association history.

Nelson had a 1695 scratch total going into the scratch singles tournament. In this event he rolled scores of 153, 170, 185, 267, 205, and 166 for a total of 1146. This gave

him a grand total of 2841, only 10 pins shy of a 190 average for the 15-game series. In rolling the 267 game he had nine strikes in a row.

Don Jessee, process area 1, placed second with 2812. Dewey Vallandingham, cascade maintenance department, came in third with 2808.

The Company Championship has, we believe, gone to one of GAT's most deserving bowlers. Since the inception of the Company's activity program, Nelson has been one of the king-pins in the bowling program. He has served on the Company Bowling Committee, a committee responsible for formulating basic rules and regulations for the Company's various tournaments. He has been one of the guiding hands in the Men's Bowling Leagues of Portsmouth. He is a past vice-president of the Men's Thursday Night League.

In addition to bowling, he also has participated in the softball and golf programs.

Currently, he is bowling as a regular in three leagues and substitutes in a fourth. He averages 185 in the GAT Thursday Night League, 183 in the Commercial League, and 188 in the All-Star League. As a substitute, he averages 186 in the Elks League. He didn't begin bowling regularly in the Commercial League until recently when he replaced his brother, Glenn (Rocky) Nelson, who left for spring baseball training with the Pittsburgh Pirates.

He is presently one of the Executive Directors of the Portsmouth Bowling Association.

Following the conclusion of 6 scratch games bowled at the Sunset

Lanes in Portsmouth March 26, Eileen Ward, electronics department, emerged as this year's Company Champion for the women.

To qualify for the Company Championship the bowlers must have competed in the doubles & singles, and team tournaments which included 9 games. Fifteen games were required to be eligible for the Company Championship.

Eileen's 15-game series score was 2365 pins. In the scratch singles event she bowled a 6-game total of 1021 pins resulting in a 170 average. Her game scores were 168, 177, 163, 162, 181, and 170.

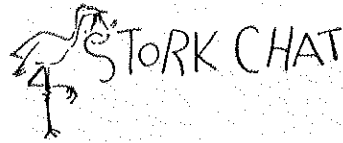

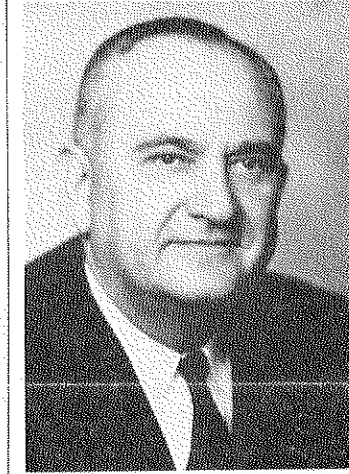

GAT Foremen's Club Schedules Rupp For Dinner Meeting April 21

The first event of the new year which has been planned by the newly installed officers of the GAT Foremen's Club is scheduled for the Elks Country Club in Portsmouth April 21.

Jack Wilkerson, plant engineering, who is general chairman for the affair, has announced that the Club has been fortunate in scheduling Mr. Adolph Rupp, basketball coach, University of Kentucky, as the principal speaker.

Mr. Rupp has been basketball coach at the University of Kentucky for three decades. Over this period the sports world has witnessed an amazing record being forged with near perfection by a colorful figure in the Bluegrass country of Kentucky known familiarly to hundreds of thousands as the "Man In the Brown Suit."

Whenever the sport of basketball is mentioned today, a direct chain of thought brings out the name of this maker of champions who holds undisputed rank as the "Nation's Winningest Basketball Coach." Such unprecedented recognition for the famous mentor is only natural, however, since his success in the past 30 years as head man of the fabulous University of Kentucky basketball teams has been nothing short of phenomenal.

Briefly, that record includes:

An amazing 626 victories out of 739 starts for an unparalleled winning percentage of better than 84 percent over the 30 years he has been at Kentucky.

An unprecedented honor roll of four NCAA Tournament championships picked up by his "Wildcats", who hold the all-time record of 11 appearances in the national classic and can claim more victories in NCAA play (21) than any other team.

A nominal world's championship as co-coach of the successful USA entry in the 1948 Olympic Games, which included members of Kentucky's NCAA champions.

Selection as the National "Coach of the Year" in 1959 for the second time in his career as he guided an inexperienced group of sophomores to a 24-3 record.

A total of 19 Southeastern Conference titles since the league was organized in 1933.

Development of more All-Americans (21) and more material for the pro ranks (17) than any other tutor.

Four Sugar Bowl Tournament championships, a National Invitation Tournament title and four successes in the first seven University of Kentucky Invitational Tournaments.

Election to the Basketball Hall of Fame in 1946 by Helms Athletic Foundation and to the Naismith Memorial Hall of Fame in 1959.

Membership on the all-important NCAA Basketball Rules Committee.

The colorful Kentucky Colonel also is active in Shrine affairs and serves as Vice-Chairman of the Shrine Crippled Children's Hospital in Lexington. He is a Past Potentate of Oleika Temple and has been honored as one of the ten outstanding Shriners of the nation. He was elected to the Kentucky Hall of Fame in 1945 and four years later was honored as the outstanding citizen of the University city of Lexington. In 1959, he also was the recipient of the Governor's medallion for meritorious service to the Commonwealth of Kentucky and of a plaque of appreciation from the U. S. Air Force.

Recognized as one of America's foremost banquet speakers, the versatile Rupp and his entertaining wit are in constant demand during the "off-season" for talks before groups in all fields.

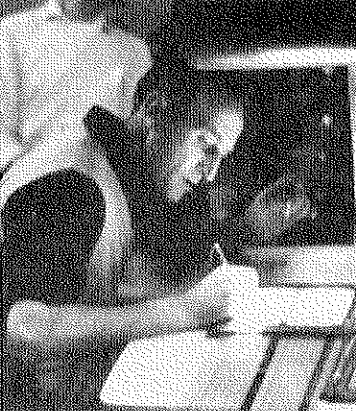
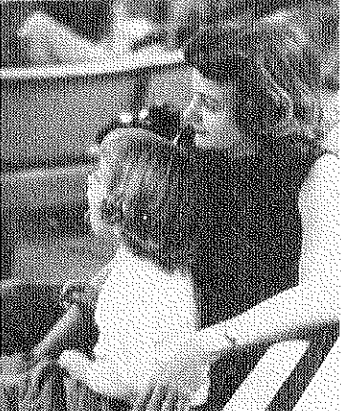
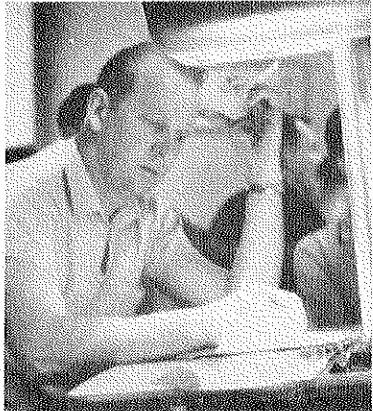
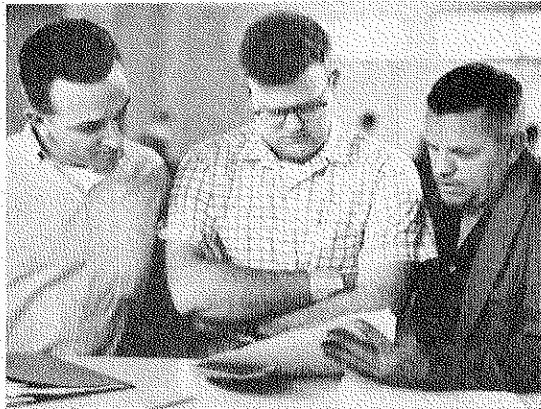
Born in Halstead, Kansas, Coach Rupp attended the University of Kansas where he played under the famed Phog Allen. Following graduation in 1923, he coached high school ball one year at Marshalltown, Iowa, and was at Freeport, Ill., for four seasons before coming to Kentucky in 1930. His fame as "The Man In The Brown Suit" stems from his superstitious preference of brown as the color of his game-night wardrobe.

Tickets for the dinner are on sale now. Members of the Foremen's Club should contact one of the Trustees to obtain a ticket. Three-hundred dinner reservations are to be made. However, approximately 270 dinner tickets will be made available to members of the Foremen's Club. The other 30 tickets will go to high school coaches in the four-county area who are invited as guests of the Club.
