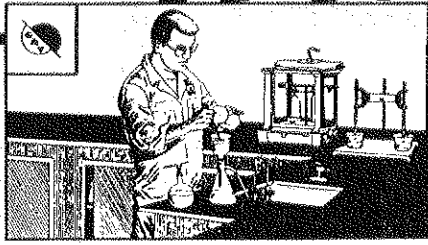

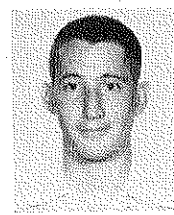

Both winners will receive the usual \$10 cash awards and be eligible for the semi-annual safety slogan prize.

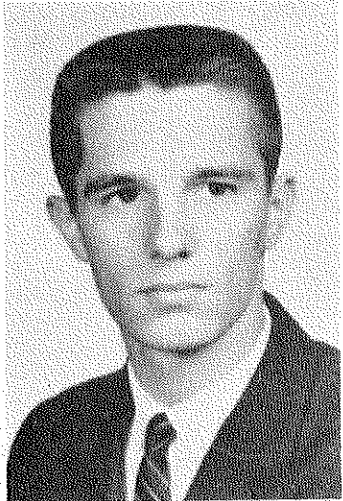

Employees are asked to submit a black and white picture of the student, with his or her name, high school, parent or parents working at GAT, and the department where the parent works. Please do not send colored photographs.

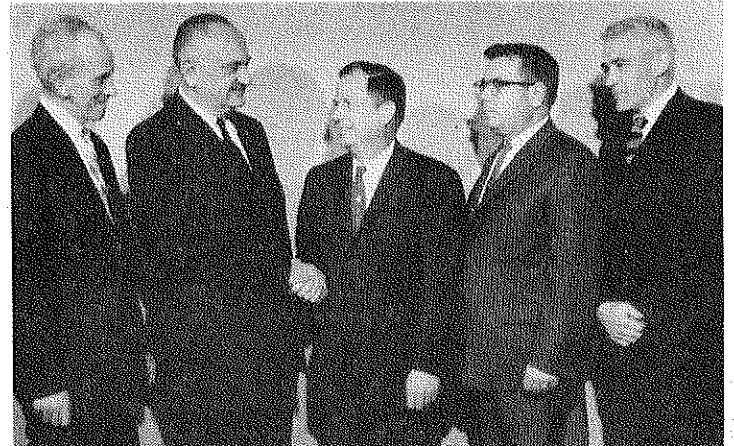

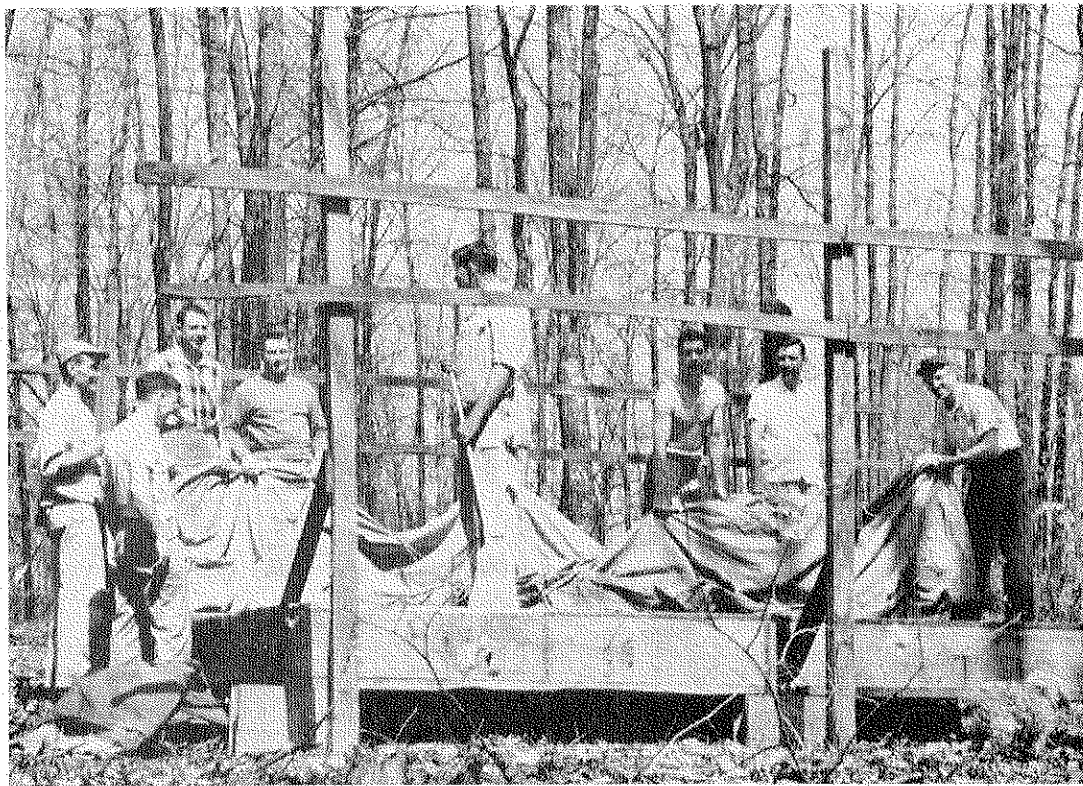
Layne & Koehler In State Rating

Scioto Council Of Girl Scouts Set Summer Camping Season; Camp Clean-Up In Progress

Goodyear Atomic employees are taking an active part in the renovation of Camp Molly Lauman Girl Scout Camp. The camp is located one mile west of State Route 104 on Bear Creek Road approximately five miles northwest of Lucasville. The approximate size of the camp is 155 acres. Facilities include a dining hall, infirmary, trading post, 5 camping units, and a swimming pool.

On Saturday, April 23, eighteen volunteers erected twenty-five tents (14' x 16') at the camp in preparation for the summer camp season. Approximately three-hundred Girl Scouts will be enrolled during the three camping periods . . . June 26-July 9; July 10-July 23; and July 24-August 6. August 15 to August 26 is scheduled for the Day Camp.

Ten of the eighteen employees working April 23, were GAT employees. Scioto Council of Girl Scouts includes four counties: Pike, Vinton, Jackson, and Scioto. Administrative officers for the Council are Mrs. Eve-

lyn Sutton (industrial relations), Executive Director; Mrs. William Taylor (engineering development), 2nd Vice-President; Mrs. Henry Steinbauer (instrumentation development), Program Committee Chairman, Board of Directors; and James Duncan, plant engineering, who heads the Facilities and Maintenance Committee. Former GAT Man Writes Home

(Editor's Note: D. H. Francis, general manager, recently received a letter from Joe Homan, formerly with Goodyear Atomic Corporation and now with Goodyear International located in Milan, Italy. Excerpts of the letter follow in as much as Joe wanted to be remembered to his friends at GAT).

Milan, Italy
April 10, 1960

"I spent a month in Pittsburgh and four days in Cleveland learning the parent company's ways of accounting, inventory, products, credits and the many other aspects of product distribution.

All of the former GAT employees in Akron send their best wishes to you and others at GAT.

Had a very nice trip over . . . from Cleveland by conventional airship . . . from LaGuardia to Idlewild via helicopter and over the Atlantic by Jet. We had a delay in Paris because of the lateness of a connecting plane to Milan, but we couldn't leave our room. As a result we did not see any of Paris.

Milan is a beautiful old city of narrow streets, fast drivers, and a lot of noise and hustle, similar to a northern city in the States. We found the meals to be too much food and too long (in time) for our style of faster eating. We have since learned to convey the idea of only a sandwich or 'shorta meals' to them, and when you order milk, it's nearly sacrilegious. Wine is used here more freely than H₂O and is cheaper.

It is typically a city of apartments and fast dealers (in apartments that is), and only when you have a contract in hand are you sure you have a place to stay. There are virtually no houses here for purchase or rent. Our newest prospect is in a new apartment building at Monoa, about seven or eight miles from Milan. If we get that one, tell Bernie Haas we will be within two miles of the only golf course around Milan.

Meal times (lunch) are two hours in length and we work until 6:30 p. m. I have eaten dinner as late as 10 p. m.

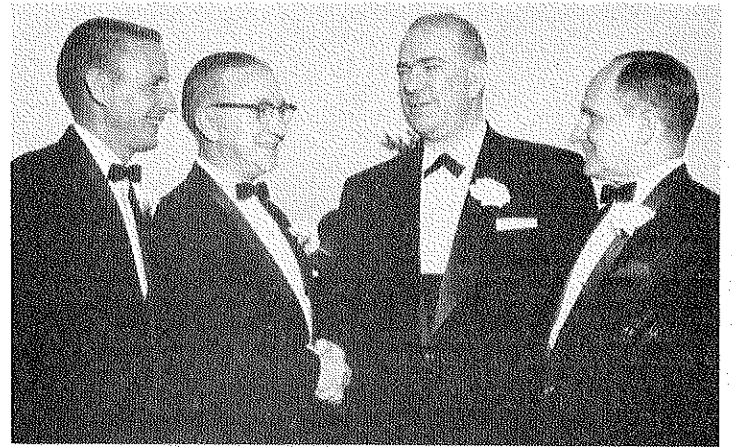
Sam Trano (my boss) sends his best regards to Bill Sams and Bob Rced.

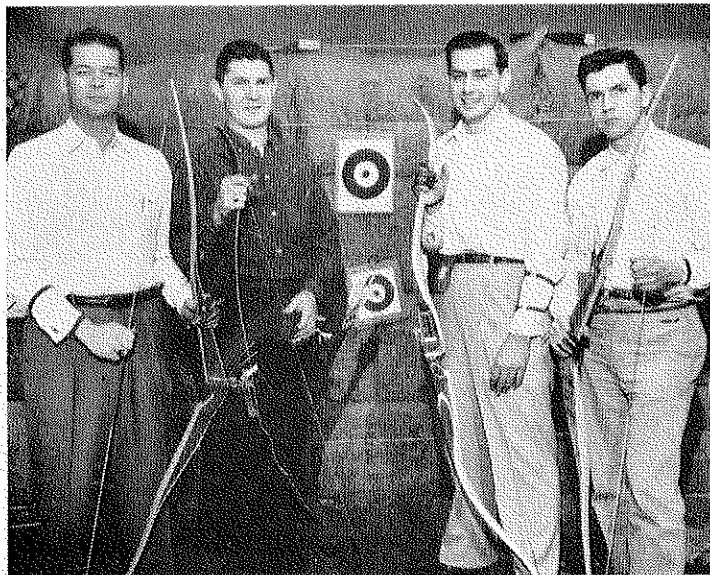
