**Review of Labor Relations**

Members of the Oil, Chemical, and Atomic Workers International Union, AFL-CIO and its affiliated Local 10-689 accepted on May 6, 1961, a general pay increase of nine cents per hour for all classifications effective May 1, 1961.

A tentative agreement resulted in two proposals being presented to the Union members at meetings called at 1:30 p. m. and 4:30 p. m., May 6. The first proposal ranged from 7.5 cents to 9.5 cents proportioned through the various labor grades. The second proposal was an increase of all base hourly wage rates by 9 cents.

The Company was advised by letter dated May 8, and signed by J. F. Wettstein, President, Local 10-689, OCAWIU, that the Union membership had ratified the tentative agreement of 9 cents per hour wage increase for all of the base hourly rates set forth in Appendix D of the current contract.

Representing the Union in final negotiations were L. T. Koletka, International Representative; H. L. Drenner, District 10 Director, OCAWIU; J. F. Wettstein, Martin Picklesimer, C. A. Romine, James N. Sansom, and C. D. Carter, Local 10-689.

Negotiations between the Company and the United Plant Guard Workers, Local 66, will begin May 25.

**AEC Award Of Honor**

**Goodyear Atomic Receives Two Safety Awards At Annual Safety Banquet**

Goodyear Atomic Corporation received two awards at the Portsmouth Safety Council's Annual Safety Banquet May 4, sponsored jointly by the Portsmouth Area Chamber of Commerce and the Industrial Commission of Ohio.

G. H. Reynolds, general manager, received the awards on behalf of GAT employees for working 3,346,238 man-hours from September 3, 1959 to June 8, 1960 without a disabling injury. In accepting the awards Mr. Reynolds said, "We are proud of our employees for their safety accomplishments. Last year was our safest year. Safety promotion is an integral part of Goodyear's philosophy and Goodyear Atomic's safety achievements rate at the top of the Atomic Energy industry's gaseous diffusion plants.

GAT received a special award from the Industrial Commission of Ohio and an Award of Honor from the National Safety Council. Earlier the Atomic Energy Commission had presented GAT with an Award of Honor for the same safe working period.

The employees of this plant are now approaching the 4,000,000 safety man-hour figure. With a concerted effort on the part of all employees a new safety record can be established this calendar year. The 5-million

man-hour figure can be reached in 1961.

The calendar year 1960 was GAT's safest year to date. Only one disabling injury occurred. This presents a challenge to every GAT employee to improve last year's achievement. The 1960 frequency rate was 0.24 and the severity rate 92. Only 1673 minor injuries were reported and 10 temporary partial disabilities.

The attitude of every employee should be a sincere effort and honest desire to make Goodyear Atomic Corporation a safe and pleasant place to work.

**Company Picnic Returns To Camden Amusement Park June 3**

GAT's Eighth Annual Picnic will be held Saturday, June 3, 1961. This year the picnic site shifts back to the Camden Amusement Park, located six miles west of Huntington, West Virginia.

The Park will be reserved for Goodyear Atomic employees and members of their families from 12 noon until 4 p. m. However, the Park will open at 11 a. m. The amusement rides will be available to everyone during the 4-hour period.

The annual picnic is one of the major employee activities. This year attendance is expected to reach 5,000. Many families spend the entire day at the Park. The Park has added additional picnic areas to accommodate those who wish to enjoy a family outing. A fine cafeteria is available within the Park grounds for those who wish short order lunches or a complete dinner.

Employees who have been laid off since January 1, 1961 are being invited to attend the Annual Picnic.

Invitations are being mailed to the employee's home in order to determine the number of tickets required.

A portion of the letter of invitation includes space to designate the number of tickets desired. This portion should be completed and returned to: Recreation Department, Goodyear Atomic Corporation, P. O. Box 628, Portsmouth, Ohio.

As an added attraction for the adults, Bingo has been added to the program of entertainment. Merchandise prizes will be awarded to the winners.

The miniature golf course will open at 12 noon and participants are asked to register and note their score. The three lowest recorded scores at 3 p. m. by the men and women will be eligible for a championship play-off. Winners of each threesome will

receive a gift. The championship playoff will include adults only.

The grand drawing will be conducted at 2:30 p. m. The amusement rides will remain open during the drawing.

As in previous years, admission and refreshment tickets have been distributed through division offices. Each person planning to attend the Picnic has been given one admission ticket plus two refreshment tickets.

The refreshment tickets are good for a soft drink, custard cream, cotton candy, snow cones, or popcorn. In addition each employee will be given a drawing ticket for one of the fourteen prizes which will be given out at 2:30 p. m. The prizes include an Electric Frying Pan and Lid; Dormeyer Blender; Portable Hand Mixer; Quarter-inch Electric Drill; Electric Razor; Cooker-Fryer Pan; Transistor Portable Radio; Electric Toaster; Automatic Coffee Maker; Hair Dryer; Electric Can Opener; Stainless Steel Cooker; Aluminum Stepladder; and Window Fan.

A suggested travel route to the Park is Route 52 to Ironton. Turn right on Route 75 to Seventh Street. Seventh Street is one-way east and dead-ends at Wyannoke Street. Turn right to Route 52 and left to the

Ashland bridge. At this point employees have a choice of traveling the Kentucky or the Ohio side to the Park site. Route 52 will continue on to Chesapeake. At this point turn right across the Huntington bridge and right again on Route 60 to the Park. Those who wish to cross the bridge at Ashland will turn left on Route 60 to the Park.

Employees required to work at the plant on June 3, are requested to sign the right side of their ticket, tear off and give it to the shift superintendent not later than 4 p. m., June 2. These tickets will be deposited in the drawing container at the picnic site prior to the drawing at 2:30 p. m.

## Safety Practice Away From The Job Prevents Possible Serious Injury To This Employee

The safety program at Goodyear Atomic Corporation is presented to the employees with the hope that safe work practices will be carried out on and off the job. This hope was fulfilled in the case of W. F. Creech, instrument maintenance department.

Creech has developed the wise practice of using the safety equipment which the Company makes available. The practice of wearing safety shoes on and off the job really paid off recently. His safety shoes were purchased through the GAT stores department at a greatly reduced price.

Working at his home near Wakefield, Creech was using a 21" (3½HP) chain saw. He was sawing a log placed at an angle on another log. His left foot was placed on top. When the saw was approximately ½" into the log it hit an object imbedded within the log causing the saw to buck and fall on his left foot. Before he was able to release the trigger of the saw the blade had cut through the leather of his safety shoe exposing the steel cap.

Creech's experience off the job proved the value of wearing safety shoes. Because he was aware of the possible danger involved, and because he was wearing safety shoes at the time of the accident, he avoided possible serious injury to his left foot.

## Lauds Community Spirit Of Portsmouth & Chillicothe

### GAT Foremen's Club Hear Dean Gubitz Tell About Growth Of OU's Branch System

Professor Albert C. Gubitz, Dean of the Ohio University Branch System, was the principal speaker for the spring dinner meeting of the GAT Foremen's Club at the Portsmouth Elks Country Club, April 28.

The occasion marked the first activity under the Club's new officers.

Dean Gubitz outlined the history of the Branch System telling those in attendance of the growing importance of the Portsmouth and Chillicothe Branches to the educational needs of the youth of this area.

Ohio University's Branch System began in September of 1946 with three branch colleges established in Chillicothe, Portsmouth and Zanesville.

Since that time the OU Branch program has expanded until there are branches in Chillicothe, Portsmouth, Zanesville, Martins Ferry, Ironton, Lancaster and Lockbourne Air Force Base in Columbus. A special program has also been in effect at Goodyear Atomic Corporation since 1956.

Dean Gubitz praised the residents of Chillicothe and Portsmouth for the community efforts which will provide day-time branches of Ohio University. Ohio University at Chillicothe was the first branch in the state to start a complete day-time program. With the addition of Portsmouth's day-time branch program, scheduled to open this fall, Ohio University will have two day-time branches to help educate the youth of Ohio. The Chillicothe day-time branch began classes last fall.

An enthusiastic speaker, Dean Gubitz emphasized that "we have taken the education to the community with

our branch colleges." He stated that a great many people do not realize the value of starting a college career in one of our branches. "In money alone," he said, "there is a substantial saving. The cost to the student at a branch college is approximately \$350-\$375 per year as compared to \$1400 on campus."

"In this day and age, there is no excuse for a young man or woman not continuing his or her education. Plenty of scholarships are available." Dean Gubitz concluded his remarks to the Foremen's Club by stating that the Ohio University branch system is seriously concerned with the education of future students and the branch college, as developed in Chillicothe and Portsmouth, is one answer to the educational demands of the next ten years. "Education," he said, "is the backbone of the country and it should be every citizen's prime concern."

In the absence of Jack Wilkerson, Club President, Dewey Wright, a member of the Board of Trustees, presented Fred Pickens, employment department, who, in turn, introduced the speaker.
