Goodyear vs Ohio University At Clay High School February 1

The GAT Foremen's Club has completed plans for the basketball game between the Goodyear Wingfoots and Ohio University. The game is scheduled to begin at 8 p. m., Thursday, February 1, in the Clay High School gymnasium.

The admission prices are \$1 for adults and 50 cents for students. No seats are reserved. Early reports on ticket sales indicate a capacity crowd. The gymnasium doors will open at 7 p. m. with the teams scheduled to take the floor for warm-ups at 7:30 p. m. There will be no preliminary game. Half-time entertainment will be provided.

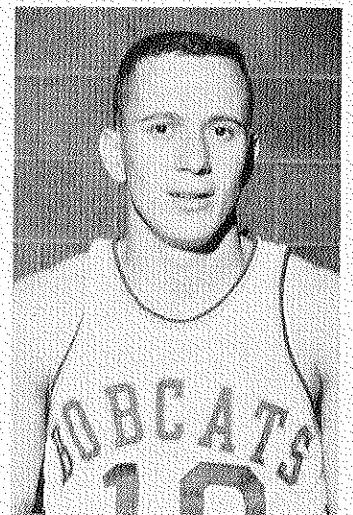
"To date, the Goodyear Wings

have a record of 28 wins and no defeats," says Jack Wilkerson, Foremen's Club President. "Twenty-two of these wins were recorded during their Near East tour; two against the Texaco Oilers of Holland, Mich., one against the Cleveland Carneys, one against the Ford Motor Company of Cleveland, and one against the Swedish Olympic Club."

Leading the scoring parade for Goodyear so far this season is 6-5 forward Bill Reigel, former McNeese State (La.) star. He is averaging over 25 points per game.

Recent additions to the Goodyear squad include center Leon Hill, 6-6, from Texas Tech., and Dick Davies, 6-1, who is a guard from Louisiana State College.

Other high scorers include forwards Jerry Wolf and Pete McCaffrey, guard Charlie Decker and center Lloyd Sharrar.

Upon graduation from West Virginia where he earned All-American honors, Sharrar was the second draft choice of the National Basketball Association's Philadelphia Warriors.

Returning for his third season with the Goodyears is Charley Decker, the 6-1 McNeese State (La.) guard who is considered one of the stadiest, all around players on the Goodyear team.

At one of the forward posts will be Pete McCaffrey, former St. Louis University star and outstanding rookie last season for the Seattle Buchanan Bakers.

At 6-6, the 22-year-old Kansas City, Mo., native is a tough boardman and an accurate jump shot artist from the sides or corners. McCaffrey holds the University of St. Louis single game scoring record with a 39-point effort against the University of Wichita.

Playing his third season with the Wingfoots, Bill Reigel, the 6-5 former McNeese State (La.) College All-American leads the Goodyear team in scoring. A lefthanded artist who scores with outside hook shots or driving Jayups, the 29-year-old Monaca, Pa., native counted 1,215 points in the past two seasons of play.

Jerry Wolf, another forward, 6-5 ex-Ohio University cager, opens his third season as a member of the Goodyears.

Fast for his size, Wolf rebounds strong off the boards and drives well, with a one-handed jump from the key.

The guards are hard-driving Bob McLaughlin, 6-2 who played the past two seasons for the Seattle Buchanan

Wise Owl Club

W. L. Harbert, sheet metal shop, is the most recent GAT employee to become a member of the Wise Owl Club of America.

The Wise Owl Club is an organization sponsored by the National Association for the Prevention of Blindness.

Harbert is the 30th member of the Wise Owl Club from Goodyear Atomic Corporation since the Club was chartered April 23, 1955. A. E. Creech, cascade maintenance department, was the first member.

On December 8, 1961, Harbert, while wearing green calabar safety glasses with side shields, was soldering door latches. The solder bubbled up and exploded. The molten solder struck both lens of the safety glasses.

It is believed that the use of safety glasses by Mr. Harbert, on the job, prevented serious injury or the possible loss of sight in one or both of his eyes.

Parent Company Purchases German Tire Production Plant

The Goodyear Tire & Rubber Company has purchased all of the shares of Gummiwerke Fulda K. G. D. A., one of Germany's largest tire producers.

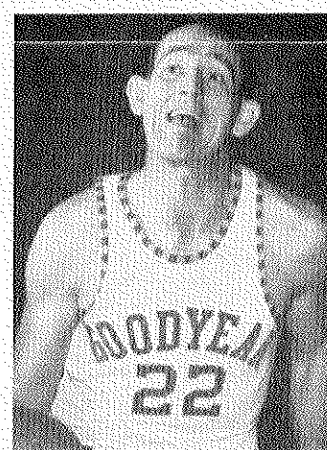
The German plant becomes a wholly-owned Goodyear subsidiary. Located at Fulda, Germany, about 50 miles southeast of Frankfurt, the plant holds a major position in the German original equipment, replacement, and export tire markets.

Goodyear has been marketing Goodyear brand tires in Germany through a subsidiary since 1955.

The company has five other tire manufacturing plants in the European market area, with extensive facilities in France, Sweden, England, Scotland and Benelux. Just recently, Goodyear announced a new \$6 million synthetic plant near LeHavre, France.

The operation of the Fulda plant will continue under its own name through its present marketing organization.

Fulda represents the 66th manufacturing location in the worldwide Goodyear network.

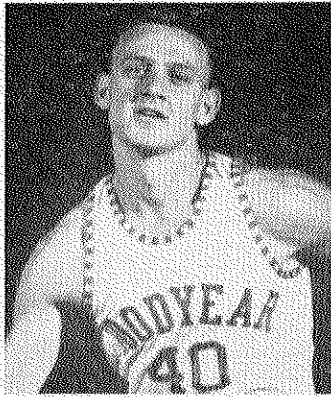

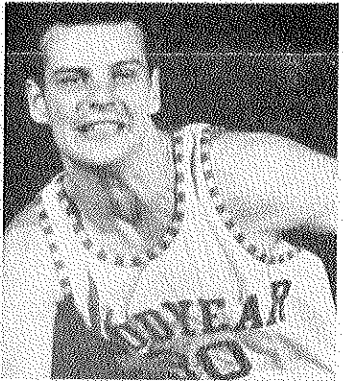

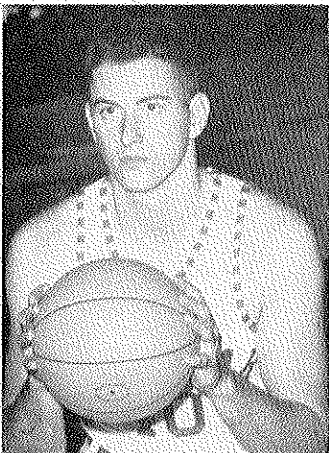
McLaughlin is a New Albany, Ind. native and a former Loyola University of New Orleans star. The Hoosier is tough on driving layups or short setups from the outside.

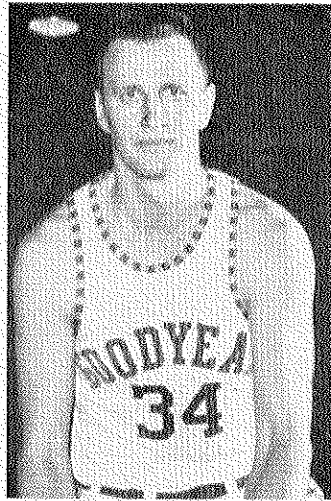

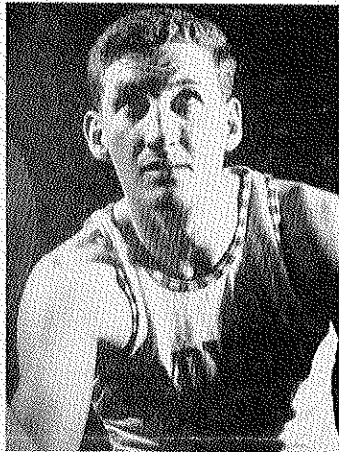

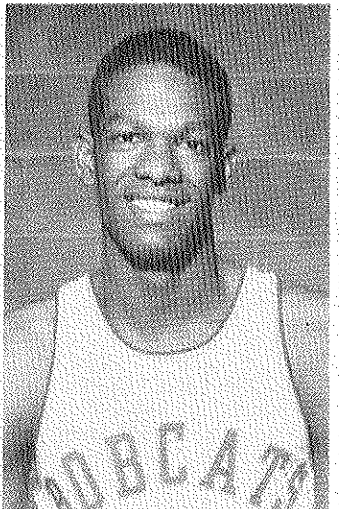

April 16, 1962 is the deadline for filing personal income tax returns.

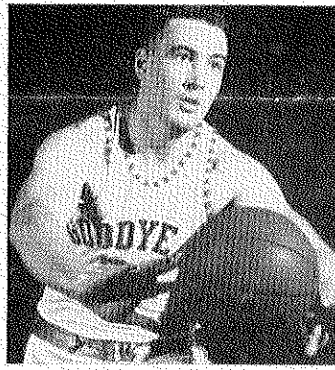

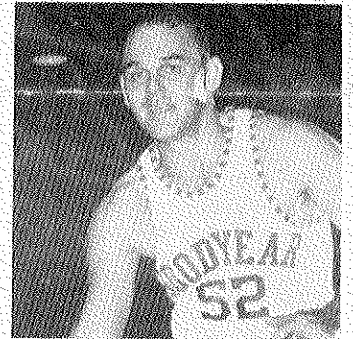

Paul Storey, a 6-5 sophomore from Xenia High School, is an excellent shot and rebounds well. He was the third leading scorer for the freshman team last season.

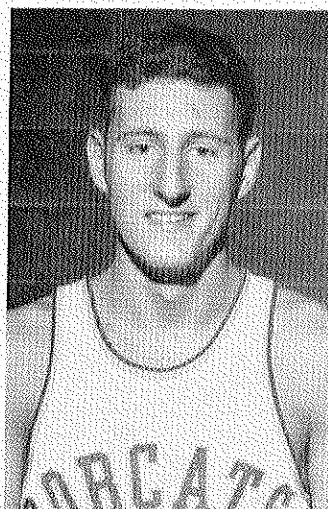

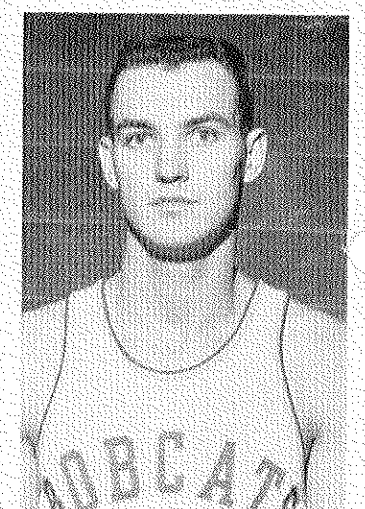

The distance from Wellston to plantsite and back is approximately 65 miles. Over an 8-year span that totals approximately 130,000 miles of travel.

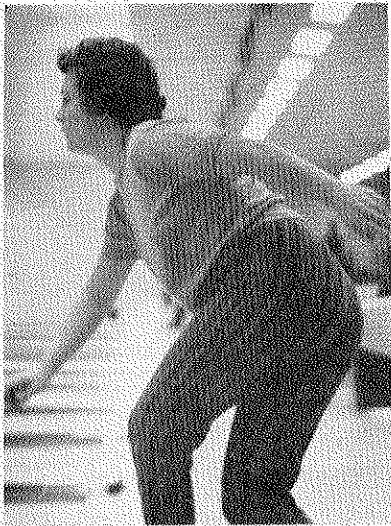
