The conference, sponsored by the Detroit Steel Management Club, has, in the past, proven to be very popular among supervisory employees

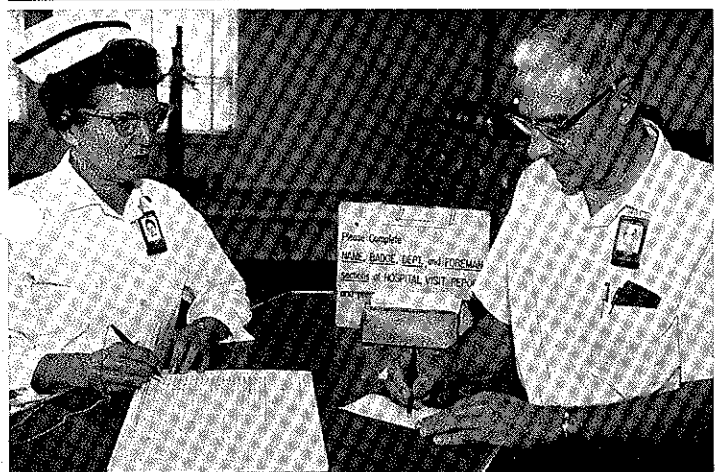
of area industries. Many area industries cooperate and the Goodyear Atomic Foremen's Club plays an important role in the conference program planning.

J. R. Shoemaker, laboratory services subdivision, is this year's Program Chairman. Other GAT em-

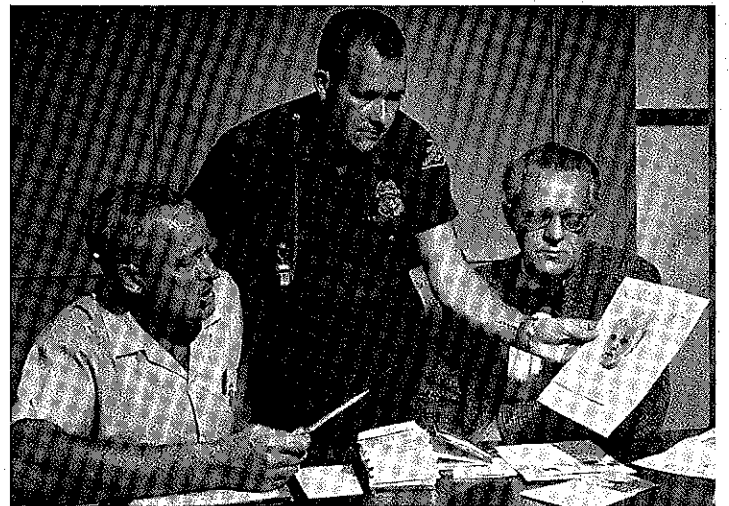

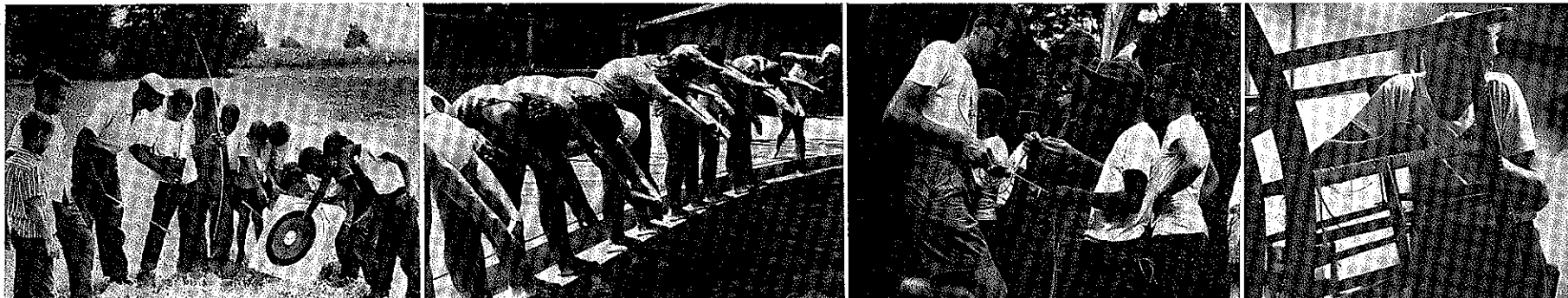
This year's Conference Chairman is Tom Schwamburger, Past-President, The Detroit Steel Management Club. The Planning Committee estimates an attendance of 500.

The Ninth Annual Labor-Management All-In-One Campaign begins next Monday, October 8, and continues through Monday, October 15.

Goodyear, as a Company, with the support of the bargaining units (Locals 3-689, OCAWIU, and 66, UPGWA) has for many years, supported this one-time approach which provides financial support to the United Funds. The All-In-One Campaign at Goodyear Atomic Corporation is the only authorized in-plant solicitation which provides funds for operating expenses to the many agencies in the United-Funds-in-the four-county area. The Company feels that this concentrated effort helps to eliminate multiple fund drives.

Money contributed through the annual All-In-One Campaign is distributed to the United Fund of

YOUR choice. Four United Funds serve the communities surrounding plantsite. They are: Jackson County United Fund; Pike County United Fund; Ross County United Fund; and the Scioto County United Fund. YOUR dollars support the dozens of services provided by the agencies which are members of these United Fund groups. YOUR money provides these much-needed services to the people throughout the four-county area.

Included in the United Fund are agencies which serve the health and welfare needs of YOUR community as well as groups which provide the community's youth with recreation and supervised leisure-time activities . . . assisting in the training of tomorrow's leaders.

By now, no doubt, you are aware

of the various agencies included in the United Fund in your county. Let's take a look at some of these agencies. For example, last year Jackson County allocated \$742.15 to the Mental Health Association; recreational groups in Jackson, Wellston, and Oak Hill received \$3,897.27. This year the goal in Jackson County is \$31,000. This is an increase of \$1,000 over last year.

In Pike County the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts each received \$2,729 and the YMCA was allocated \$2,046. The goal in Pike County for the 1962 United Fund Drive is \$16,000.

The Ross County United Fund is seeking an increase of eight percent over last year's goal of \$140,203.57. Three of the eleven agencies included in this United Fund are the Goodwill Industries (\$4,550), Carver Community Center (\$7,141), and the American Red Cross (\$25,928).

In Scioto County, the goal has been increased approximately \$9,000. Typical of the 23 agencies included in this Fund are: 14th Street Community Center (\$8,000), Salvation Army (\$22,400), and the YMCA (\$22,500).

Last year the United Funds in the four counties received contributions from the employees and the Company in the following amounts: Jackson—\$3,181.49; Pike—\$8,358.49; Ross—\$5,806.89; and Scioto \$11,077.08.

There's always room for practice, study, research and development of safety procedures. Do your part, and share in the future."

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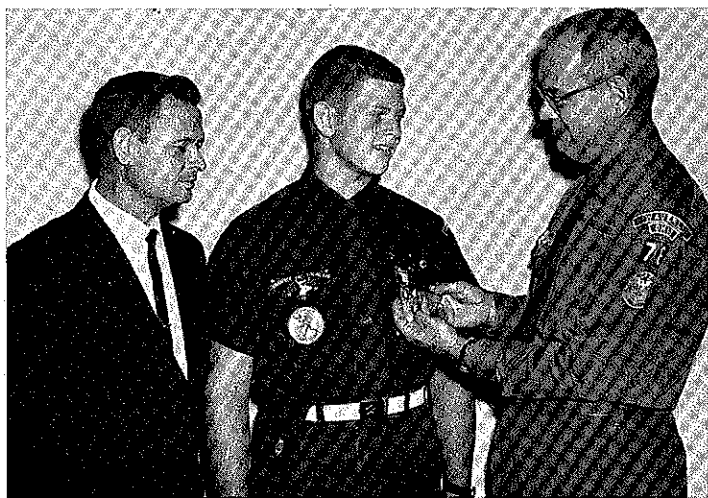

Tenth Anniversary Message

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following are excerpts of an address delivered by E. J. Bloch, Assistant General Manager for Operations, USAEC, at the Tenth Anniversary Banquet.

The Portsmouth Gaseous Diffusion Plant was the climax of a record-breaking expansion program which equipped our country with the capability for providing all the U-235 needed for our defense and civilian programs, and also permitted this country to provide enriched uranium to foreign countries. This would not have been possible without plants like this.

The success with which this plant has been operated by the Goodyear Atomic Corporation has been highly gratifying to the Commission. Through increased operating efficiency, resulting both from improvement in management techniques and benefits of the process improvement and development program, Goodyear has made substantial contributions toward increasing plant output and reducing costs.

The product of this plant finds use from Pole to Pole, on the seven seas and in space. For example, the Portable Medium Power Plant — a Pressurized water reactor with a net electrical power of 1500 kwe — is operating at the McMurdo Sound in

Antarctica. The plant provides electricity and heat for melting snow at the Naval Air Facility there. This is the first use of a land-based power reactor anywhere south of the equator.

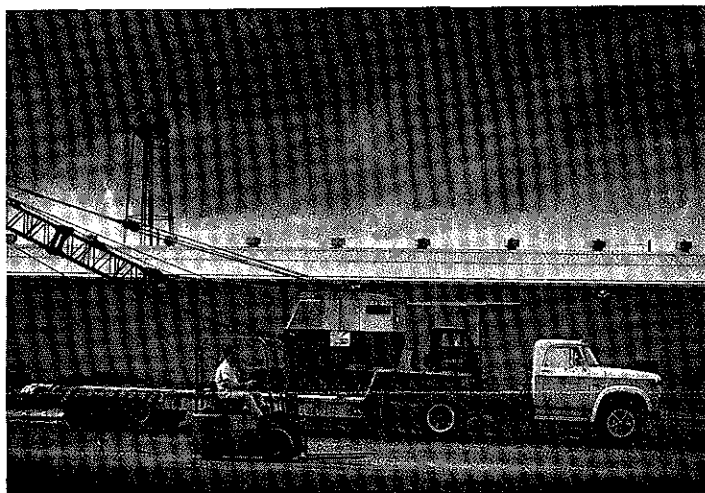
In northern Greenland, the Portable Medium Power Plant No. 2A became the first reactor supplying power and heat for a remote post. It is also the first prefabricated, packaged, air-transportable reactor plant that was put into operation. This power plant also has a capacity of 1500 kwe.

Both of these reactors are fueled with enriched uranium.

For the past several months the AEC, at the request of the President, has been making a study with regard to the future role of civilian

nuclear power in the U.S. economy. This study when released will, I am sure, be of particular interest to all forward looking industries, and will be of special importance to groups such as you have here at Goodyear who have played such an important role in the over-all atomic energy program. It will also provide added assurance to the long-range future for your plant's product. So on this, your tenth birthday, I salute as proud members of a team which have contributed, and will continue to contribute so vitally to our Nation's defense effort; which, in the future, will be making vital contributions to the conquest of space and to the development of world energy resources.

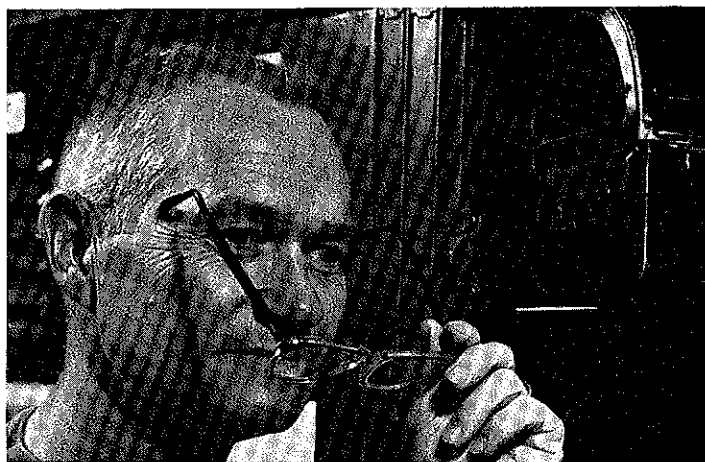
Safety Glasses Provided For YOU

Safety glasses are important to Goodyear Atomic employees. Many jobs REQUIRE the use of safety glasses as "standard equipment" once they begin their working shift. As one employee who is holder of a Wise Owl certificate said, "When I put my dinner pail in my locker, I 'just naturally' put on my safety glasses." This is a safety habit that's wise for anyone to practice.

The use of safety equipment by GAT employees is a fringe benefit that isn't visible in the pay check . . . but it could save dollars in medical bills and lost time.

The Company pays the entire cost of safety glasses. Since 1954, 5,408 pairs of safety glasses, 2,182 of which have been prescription glasses, have been purchased by the Company.

This type of intangible benefit is an advantage to both the Company and the employee. The actual dollars

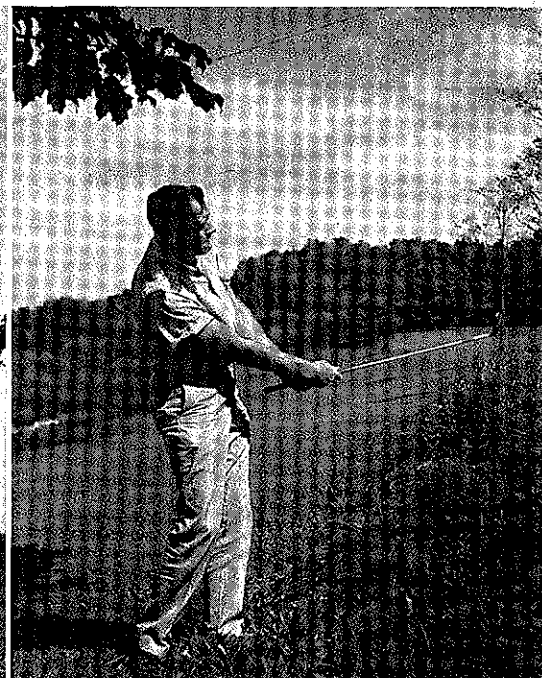
The tournament, which was held at Norwalk, Ohio, on September 1-2, attracted 385 participants in the over-all tournament. Fifty archers participated in the 325 class.

September 16, 1962, was L. E. Fuller's anniversary with Goodyear.

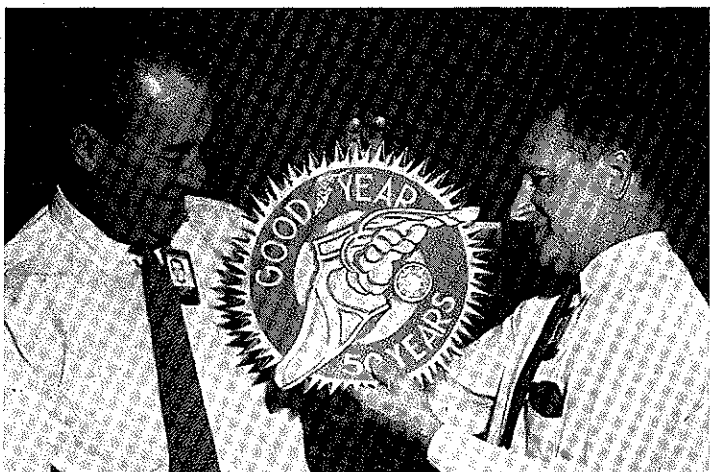
