



GAT, United Plant Guards Agree To Three-Year Pact



J. D. Wilkerson, supervisor, plant engineering, is transferring to the Goodyear International Corporation on June 16, 1963.


Following orientation & training in Akron, he will become manager, engineering department, The Goodvear Tire & Rubber Company of India Private, Ltd., New Delhi, India.

Cox was awarded the Boy Scout Statuette for outstanding performance in the Chief Logan Council as a member of the Executive Board.


