



## Tomorrow's Tires


If man fails in this decade to launch a supersonic jet transport, explore the moon or break his previous world land speed records, it won't be for lack of tires capable of doing the job.


Hartz described Goodyear's multimillion-dollar testing facilities through the medium of a 20-minute color movie with Japanese sound track



#### RIHES

Lost or Out of Bounds

If a ball be lost outside a water hazard or be out of bounds, the player shall play his next stroke as nearly as possible at the spot from which the original ball was played by him, adding a penalty stroke to his score for the hole. If the original stroke was played from the teeing ground, a ball may be teed anywhere within the teeing ground; if from the green or hazard, it shall be dropped; if on the putting green, it shall be placed.

Exception for out of bounds: When conditions justify, the Committee may adopt a Local Rule to read as follows: If a ball be out of bounds, the player may drop a ball, under penalty of one stroke, within two clul. lengths of the place where the ball last crossed the boundary line. A player has the right at any time of ascertaining whether his opponent's ball is out of bounds.

A player may stand out of bounds to play a ball lying within bounds. Unplayable

The player is the sole judge as to whether his ball is unplayable. It may be declared unplayable at any place on the course.

When a ball is declared unplayable, play his next shot from where the previous shot was made; drop a ball, under penalty of one stroke either within two club-lengths of the point where the ball lay, but not nearer the hole or behind the point where the ball lay, keeping that point between himself and the hole, with no limit to how far behind that point the ball may be dropped.
