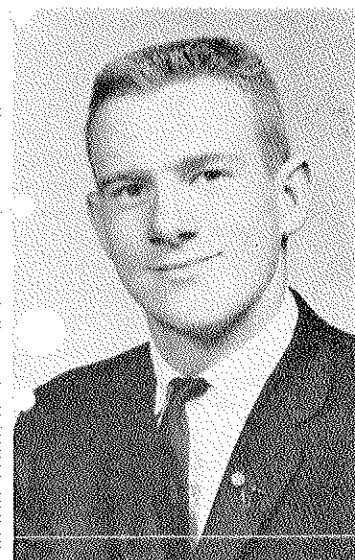

## Computer To Be Part Of Family By 2000

An electronic computer will be as much a part of every American middle-class home in the year 2000 as the kitchen sink is today, according to Albert J. Gracia, vice president of research, Goodyear, Akron.

By that time, virtually every middle-class home "will have a control center of electronic computation for keeping budgets, planning menus, figuring income tax, reminding the family of appointments, helping the family to arrive at a policy decision and, yes, helping junior with his high school homework."

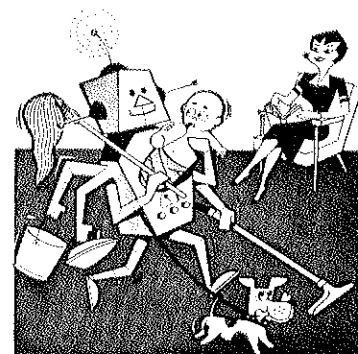
Gracia speculated on the many wonders that science and engineering will produce during the next 35 years while addressing a special group of Ohio high school students attending a conference at Ohio State University.

Even clothing will have undergone drastic changes by the turn of the 20th century, he said. "Paper will be developed to the extent that softly textured, durable and fashionable clothing made inexpensively with adhesive seams, instead of sewing, will be widely worn."

In the field of medicine, he said,

great progress can be expected in the prevention and control of infection, as well as the treatment of the sick, the crippled, the deaf and the blind.

Gracia was General Manager of GAT from September, 1953 to January, 1956.

## The Safety Corner

"What happens in the first fatal second after a car going 55 miles per hour hits a solid object?"

In the first tenth of a second, the front bumper and grille collapse. The second tenth finds the hood crumpling, rising and striking the windshield as the spinning rear wheels lift from the ground. Simultaneously, fenders begin wrapping themselves around the solid object, and although the car's frame has been halted, the driver's car is still going 55 miles per hour.

Instinct causes the driver to stiffen his legs against the crash . . . and they snap at the knee joint.

During the third tenth of the second the steering wheel starts to disintegrate and the steering column aims for the driver's chest.

The fourth tenth of the second finds two feet of the car's front end wrecked while the rear end still moves at 55 miles per hour and the driver's body is still traveling at 55 miles per hour.

In the fifth tenth the driver is impacted on the steering column and blood rushes to his lungs.

The sixth tenth of a second finds the impact built up to the extent that feet are ripped out of tightly laced shoes. The brake pedal breaks off. The car frame buckles in the middle and the driver's head bangs into the windshield as the rear wheels, still spinning, fall back to earth.

In the seventh tenth hinges rip loose, doors open and the seat breaks free, striking the driver from behind. But he doesn't mind, because he is already dead, and the last three tenths of a second mean nothing to him."

## Goodyear Enters Indianapolis "500"

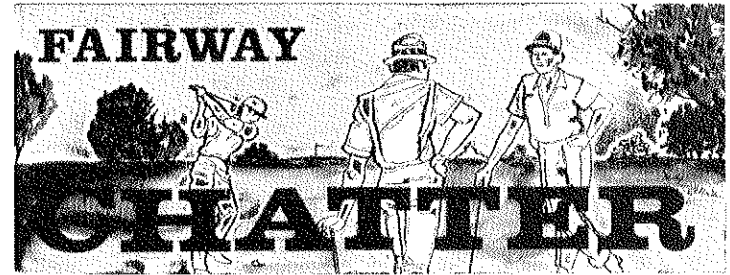
Goodyear will be represented in the Indianapolis 500 this year for the first time since 1922.

At the end of the first weekend of qualifying rounds for the Memorial Day classic, seven drivers had qualified on Goodyear tires.

Among them, were two of the first-row cars, including the pole car. Defending champion A. J. Foyt won that position in his Goodyear-equipped Lotus Ford with the record-breaking qualifying speed of 161.233 mph.

Dan Gurney occupying the third position in the first row after Jimmie Clark, also qualified on Goodyears. Clark's speed was 160.279, and Gurney averaged 158.898.

From 1922 until last year Goodyear had not offered tires designed for the 500.

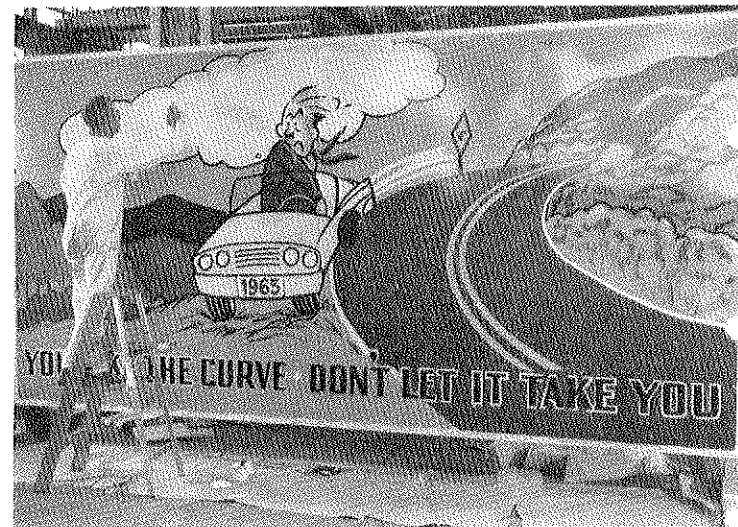
