Employe Contributions Aid Cost Improvement Program

Cooperation and team effort is "paying off" at GAT and the payoff is mounting in dollars. These dollars are adding to a substantial savings in our cost improvement program.

Employes in shipping, receiving and in stores have combined their efforts and formed a plan which has contributed some excellent suggestions to our cost savings program.

The plans got organized when employes in the department got together for cost reduction sessions. The meetings uncovered a number of excellent ideas and proved to be productive enough to continue on a regular basis.

Shipping and receiving is responsible for plantwide distribution of the thousands of items purchased by GAT. Personnel in the department have developed a "critical eye" that looks over each shipment for possible savings.

When an item appears to be overpriced, it is checked with past stores records and then brought to the attention of the purchasing department. Purchasing continues the investigation by contacting the manufacturer and the consumer.

An average of 4 to 5 items are reviewed each week, approximately one reaches the cost reduction category.

One typical example was a heavy duty plastic bucket used in the laboratory. Receiving personnel questioned the \$3.15 price tag and GAT now pays \$1.04 for an identical container.

A check on aluminum foil revealed it was similar to the household foil found in local grocery stores. Now a savings of \$2.20 per roll is realized.

Replacement washers needed to repair vacuum pumps are fabricated in our shops for \$1.00 each in la-

Review of Labor Relations

The following arbitration award was received from Walter G. Seinsheimer who acted as arbitrator and heard the case on April 5-6, 1967.

Lack of space prevents all cases heard from appearing in this issue.

GENERAL GRIEVANCE 1-66

Grievance: The Union protests the Company application of Contract terms of Article VIII, section 5(a) and section 5(b), in not permitting a surplussed employe to exercise the option to accept a layoff.

The Company's position is that in this instance no employe has been offered a layoff, and the Company is not obligated to permit an employe to quit and to be paid a layoff allowance, when the Company does not want to terminate anyone and, in fact, has jobs for every man on its payroll.

Discussion: From a practical viewpoint, it is difficult not to agree with the Company's statement. It does seem strange that a Company should have to pay a layoff allowance to an employe who wants to quit when it needs this employe on


A Message To Our Graduating Seniors

State Park Guide Book Is Available

Goodycarites interested in camping, boating, picnicking or sightseeing will be interested in learning about "The Goodyear Guide to State Parks."

The Goodyear guide features detailed information on state parks. Also on national parks, historical sires forests and beaches. It is the first - and only - complete single source of information on these facilities.

The first volume covering New England and New York is just off the presses and may be purchased at any of the Goodyear stores in the area -- at Bierley - Henderson in Portsmouth or at either of the Goodyear stores in Chillicothe.

The well-illustrated guides may be purchased for \$1.95 per copy.

State parks offer the most numerous and varied facilities for every kind of outdoor activity. Until now, information about the state parks had been obtainable only from scattered sources, if at all. "The Goodyear Guide" has changed that.

another job, and if he does quit, the Company must hire a replacement. We can't, of course, ignore the Contract, even if the provisions may appear to be unusual. One of the options in Article VIII, section 5(b) is that the employee may accept a layoff. This seems rather clear. In the arbitrator's opinion, the Company has, as a result of Paragraphs (a) and (b) of section 5, waived any of its rights to prevent an employe who the Company has declared surplus in a classification, from exercising, if he so desires, the right which he has been granted to take a layoff and receive a layoff allowance.

It then becomes necessary to take up the issue as to whether this de-

cision and award is applicable to all similar situations that have occurred under the 1966 Labor Contract, The answer to this is quite simple, and that is that it is not applicable and is not retroactive to situations that occurred prior to this grievance that was filed on February 14, 1967.

Award: It is the Arbitrator's decision, based upon the discussion and opinions stated above, that an employe who has been declared surplus has the right to exercise any and all of the options listed under subsection (b) of section 5 of Article VIII, including "accept a layoff" . . . therefore, the grievance is granted. This decision is in no way retroactive to situations that may have occurred prior to February 14, 1967, wherein the employes involved did not file grievances within the five-day time period.
