

WHAT'S YOUR NUMBER?? Ever wonder "what goes" with those new painted numbers and recently installed telephones in the X-206B (X-100) parking lot. Well stop wondering; it's GAT's latest method of keeping track of you. The painted numbers are gathering points for

divisional personnel in the X-100 building in case of evacuation. The telephones are for use by divisional representaives to report personnel accountability. Although all eyes are on Connie Nourse (D-501), that's Art Smith (D-726) doing the painting.

New Personnel Evacuation Plan Goes Into Operation

A lot of questions have been asked about the new telephones and freshly painted numbers in the X-206B parking lot adjacent to X-100 building. Like most mysteries, their solution is simple:

The nine painted numbers are areas designated for personnel in each division when the administration building is evacuated. Seven of these numbers are for 100, 200, 300, 400, 700, and 800 division personnel

Goodyear To Host College Teachers

Goodyear is taking part in a reationwide program designed to help teachers from predominately Negro universities gain first-hand knowledge of the business word.

with two painted areas assigned to credit union and AEC personnel.

Do you know WHAT TO DO or WHERE TO GO if you are in the administration building (X-100) and the evacuation horn is sounded?

WHAT TO DO? — Classified materials should be placed in approved repositories before evacuating the building if it is possible to do so without jeopardizing one's life or safety. In event you are prevented from locking up classified materials, keep them in your possession until such time as they can be placed into safe custody.

WHERE TO GO? ---Leave the building promptly, by the route and exits indicated on the evacuation plan displayed on bulletin boards, and proceed to the designated assembly areas in the main parking lot (X-206B) east of the X-100 building. That is what the numbers painted on the parking lot are for. Assemble in your division area and report to your immediate supervisor, so in the event of a personnel accountability he can account for his employes to the divisional representative. The divisional representative will use the telephones mounted on the light poles to contact his alternate reporting point and/or the police communications office.

WHAT TO DO? — If you are away from your X-100 home base and a plantwide personnel accountability is called, there will be no one in your section to receive your reporting call since the building has been evacuated.

Alternate reporting points for each division have been established:

100 Division - Verification

Office.

200 Division — Hospital

300 Division — Telephone
Operator

400 Division — X-720 Receiving

500 Division — X-710 Mass
spectrometry shift supervisor

700 Division — X-720 Alma Coriell 800 Division — X-300 Power

So if you are away from your home office and you call back to report and no one answers, report to your alternate reporting point.

Flow Of Blood Is Excellent With 202 Pints Collected

"I"deas Submitted To AEC



Flight championships will be awarded to the golfer shooting the lowest score in each flight. Flight assignments are based on league or club averages.


The company championship is a 36-hole tourney. Employes competing in the first 18 holes at the Portsmouth Elks Club July 26 are eligible for the company championship.


The person shooting the lowest score for the 36 holes will be company champion; second dowest score will be company runner-up.

Shift personnel unable to play September 6 can make special arrangements to play earlier by contacting Recreation.



"America" To See State Fair

Like old soldiers, old blimps never die. They just lose their gas.

That is the fate of the oldest of the Goodyear blimps which has made its final trip home.


The Columbia, which has been based in Los Angeles, arrived last month at Goodyear's blimp spawning ground at Wingfoot Lake, southeast of Akron.

The journey home ended six years of service that has seen the 160-foot long aerial giant log more than 300,000 miles in trips from coast-to-coast and border-to-border.

Goodyear, which has built 299 airships in Akron since 1917, will

put a new and larger airship into service later this year and it will adopt the name Columbia. The docking of the Columbia left only one blimp, the Mayflower, based in Miami, Fla., in active service until the commissioning of the new \$2.5-million blimp, the America.

The America is expected to make an appearance at Ohio State Fair August 21-Sept. 1 before being headquartered in Houston, Texas.
