CRITICAL HOUSING SITUATION EXPECTED TO EASE WITH COMPLETION OF NEW F.H.A. PROJECTS

This month will mark the opening of the first of the newly constructed F. H. A. permanent housing projects built to help ease the critical living situation facing employees of the Portsmouth Area AEC project.

The first addition slated to be ready for occupancy is Western Hills, a 160-unit permanent apartment set-up in Chillicothe. Seventy-two of the apartments are due to be ready for occupancy by September 15 with the remainder to follow in a matter of three or four weeks.

The Western Hills apartments have two bedrooms upstairs, a living room, combined kitchen and dining room and closet space downstairs. The kitchens are fully equipped with washer, range, refrigerator and ironer.

Rental rate at Western Hills is \$87.50 a month. Occupants will pay utility costs with the exception of water. Persons must be employees of AEC.

Goodyear, Architect Engineers, PKS, Geo. Koch Sons', Grinnell Corp., or Reynolds-Newbery to be eligible for this apartment space.

Employees in need of housing space, whether family housing or sleeping rooms, are asked to contact the PKS Housing and Feeding Division Office located in the middle-west wing of the Personnel Building, Ext. 230.

Tentatively set to go on sale in mid-September are approximately 40 two and three bedroom houses in the Waverly Heights sub-division at the north edge of Waverly just off Route 23.

The selling price on this property is \$11,500 for three bedroom units and \$10,500 for two bedrooms, with a required down payment of approximately \$1,500 plus closing cost. These houses may be sold only to employees of AEC, Goodyear, Architect Engineers, PKS and

the three CPFF subcontractors.

Employees may make arrangements to buy in Waverly Heights directly with the manager, Mr. Haimann at Waverly. Upon showing sufficient intent to purchase property, certificates of eligibility will be issued by J. C. Nelson, chief of the PKS Housing and Feeding Division.

Waverly Estates, just east of Route 23 at the north edge of Waverly, will open some of its 115 permanent rental units during the first week of October. These houses are also two and three bedroom units. The monthly rate will run approximately \$75.00 to \$85.00. At this time data on kitchen facilities is not available.

Two P. H. A. temporary projects near the jobsite are also going ahead. One just east of Waverly on Route 220 will have space for 250 units and the other on Route 124 east of Picketon will accommodate about 500 units.

KOCH SONS' SUPERINTENDENT COMPLETES 42nd YEAR OF SERVICE

Last month marked the completion of the 42nd year of service with George Koch Sons' Inc. for George W. Hoelscher of Evansville, Indiana.

Hoelscher began employment with the Evansville sheet metal organization when he was 16 years old and has been with the company continuously with the exception of two years during World War I which he spent in Jacksonville, Florida.

Hoelscher's vast background has placed him in the position of general superintendent of sheet metal for the Koch Company on the Portsmouth Area project. The Evansville concern is the CPFF contractor for all sheet metal work on process buildings for the huge AEC installation.

Looking back over the years the amiable Hoelscher likes to recall his early employment in the trade when he worked nine-hour days and received six dollars a week.

Hoelscher is an active member of construction organizations having served as past president of the Evansville Foreman's Club, Sheet Metal Contractors Association and Association of Building Contractors. He was also an active member of the Evansville Sheet Metal Workers Local for 15 years.

R. E. MAI NAMED ESTIMATING CHIEF; DANIEL APPOINTED

A major change in top PKS personnel on the Portsmouth Area AEC project was made last week when Russell E. Mai, administrative assistant to General Manager George C. Holling, was transferred from that post to chief of the PKS Estimating Division.

Filling Mai's position in the general manager's office will be Ray Daniel, formerly an administrative superintendent in the PKS home office at Omaha. Milton Roelfs, previously chief of the Estimating Division, has been moved to a similar capacity in the Engineering Division. All of the changes were effective September 1.

HOSPITAL IS MOVED TO NEW LOCATION

Effective the first of September the project hospital will be located in the south-east wing of the Personnel Building. Service will be available 24 hours a day, seven days a week. A physician will be on duty from 8 A. M. until 2:30 A. M. Monday through Friday, with a first aid attendant present the remainder of the time.

Due to limited facilities treatment will be provided for occupational injuries only. Emergency treatment will be given in cases of non-occupational illness and the employee referred to his personal doctor.

Employees Urged To Keep Current Address On File

All project employees are again urged by the PKS Employee Relations Department to notify the Employment Division of any change in their residence address since being hired.

Employees must have their correct address listed at all times in order that accurate records may be maintained. In addition to the importance of company records being correct, the federal government requires the latest address of each employee be shown on the employee's Annual Earning Statement or W-2 form, for income tax purposes.

Employees may obtain, from their supervisor, a change of address form which should be filled out and returned promptly. Supervisors will forward the forms to the Employment Division where they will be entered on permanent records.

Kiewit Employee Is Electrocuted While Erecting Television Antenna

One Peter Kiewit Sons' Co. employee was killed while another and his daughter received severe shock when erecting a TV antenna at the Wakefield Trailer Court about noon on Sunday, August 23.

Killed instantly when the 30-foot antenna they were raising came in contact with a 2300-volt high tension wire was Clarence H. Jewell, 53, of 912 Third Street, Portsmouth. Injured were E. E. McCoy, 34, and his nine year old daughter Jo Edda.

Jewell, a storekeeper in the PKS Tool Control Division, was assisting McCoy in setting up the aerial next to McCoy's Trailer at the Wakefield Park. All three were standing on the ground next to the trailer when the incident occurred.

McCoy and his daughter were taken to a Portsmouth hospital. McCoy, administrative assistant to W. B. Maddux in the PKS Tool Control Division, sustained a painful back injury and severe shock. His daughter received burns on the hands and feet in addition to shock.

McCoy's condition improved rapidly and he returned to his job this week. Jo Edda was released from the hospital the day following the accident.

Services for Jewell, who came to Portsmouth from the Paducah AEC Area, were held in Crossville, Tennessee, on August 27. He is survived by his wife, Cora Lee, and three brothers.

SUPPLYING DRINKING WATER FOR PROJECT IS BIG OPERATION

Few employees stop to realize the tremendous continual effort being put forth daily by members of the Building Services Division to supply workers on the project with fresh cool water. Approximately 25,000 gallons of water are consumed each day from 425 of the 30-gallon barrels placed conveniently throughout the area.

Each separate container is emptied, refilled and iced on a swing shift basis to assure an ample supply of fresh water at all times.

During the month of August 525 tons of block ice was used to cool drinking water in addition to 26 tons of crushed ice needed for icing canteens used by ironworkers on steel erection crews.

The Building Services Department is taking every possible precaution to protect the health of each employee by preventing any contamination of drinking water. Approximately 60 to 70 of the barrels in use are taken from service each day for cleaning.

Each container is washed thoroughly with trisodium phosphate, rinsed with a soda ash fluid and a strong chlorine solution and dried before being put back in use. By this method each barrel is reconditioned at least once a week.

Personnel from the Ohio State Department of Health make frequent visits to the project to test samples of water being used for any presence of harmful bacteria.

All workers employed on water trucks have been given a complete physical examination before being assigned. Each man is required to wear rubber gloves while handling water and ice and a container of chlorine is carried on each truck for washing hands and gloves.

The Building Services Division also handles the servicing of the 35 five-gallon water coolers in the administration area. In this operation and the care of barrels in the field, Building Services estimates a total of a million and a half paper cups are used each month for drinking water.

TWO "BY JUPITER" DANCES SCHEDULED

The PKS Recreation Division has announced two "By Jupiter" dances to be held in Portsmouth and Jackson for project employees. The Portsmouth dance is set for the Eagles Hall on Friday September 25, from nine until one. Playing for the Portsmouth dance will be Lou Martin's Orchestra.

Jackson's "By Jupiter" dance will be the first in that city for A-plant employees. The affair will be held at the Memorial Building on Saturday October 3, from nine until 12 with music by Bob Clemens and his orchestra.

Admission to both dances will be free to project employees and their guest upon presentation of their "By Jupiter" card.

Keglers Open Fall And Winter Season Tonight

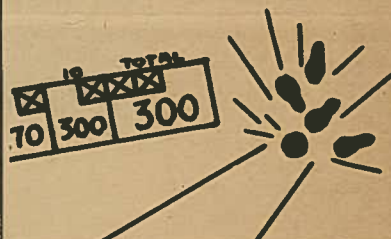

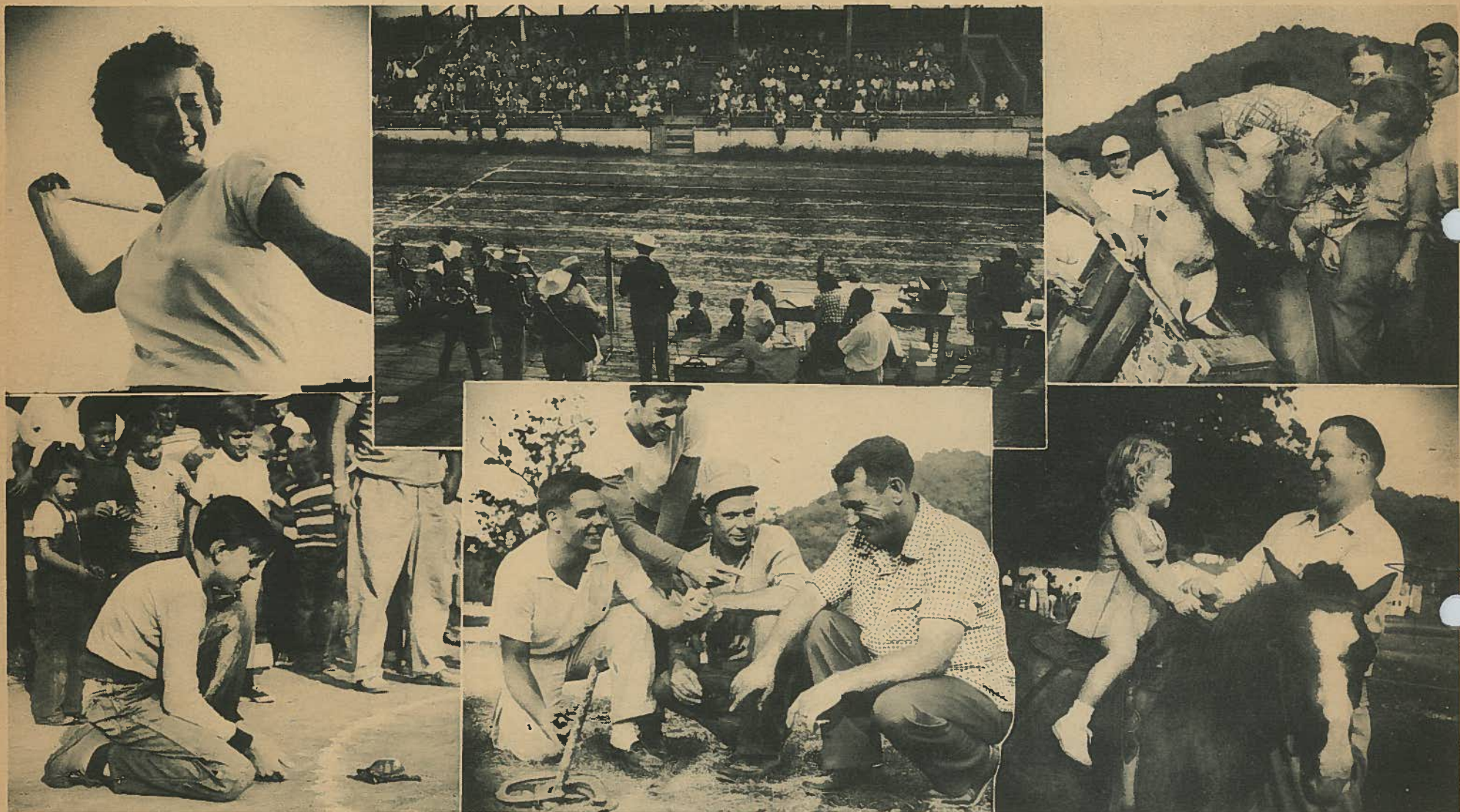

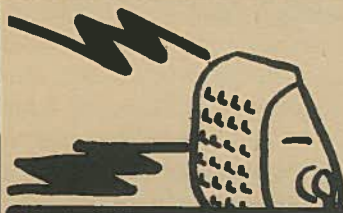
