

# LARGE STEEL ERECTING CONTRACT

The R. C. Mahon Company of Detroit, one of the many fixed-fee subcontractors that will take part in the building of the Portsmouth Area AEC installation, is rapidly completing its phase of steel erection on one of the project process buildings.

The Detroit company was awarded a six million dollar plus contract by the prime contractor, Peter Kiewit Sons' Co., for steel erection and fabrication. A total of 23,000 pounds of steel will have been used by Mahon when the job is completed.

Project Manager James P. Dei said due to transportation difficulties the steel, which was all fabricated in Detroit had to to the jobsite.

Mahon's fine safety record came in for praise by the PKS Safety Department. Only six lost time accidents were chalked up against the ironworkers in their hazardous operation in an estimated 216,000 man-hours of

Mahon's daily payroll on the job runs approximately \$14,000. Since work began, nine tons of welding rod alone has been used up in operation. An estimated 2.-500 rivets are used daily. Welding equipment, cranes, air compressors and trucks burn 250 gallons of gas each day in addition to 100 gallons of diesel oil.

The Portsmouth Area job was the first government contract ever bid on by the Mahon Company.

# **More Apartments Are Made Available At Western Hills**

An additional 38 apartments in the new 160-unit Western Hills F. H. # **Project Employees Are Members Of State Patrol Auxiliary Unit**

An acute need for Ohio State Highway Patrol personnel in the early days of World War II led to the formation of an auxiliary organization sponsored by the Ohio American Legion in 1942. The auxiliary was instituted under State Highway Patrol Superintendent Colonel George

The paramount purpose for organizing the group was to supplement the greatly depleted ranks of the State Patrol throughout the duration, however, the merits of the auxiliary during the war years were so great that the organization was continued and has grown from an original group of 500 members to approximately 5,000 at the present time.

Some 12 to 15 auxiliary patrolmen, of an estimated 300 in the surrounding four-county area, are employees at the Portsmouth Area EC project.

Each member of the group completes 60 hours of class work in regular patrol techniques before becoming active auxiliary members. Classes are instructed by State Highway Patrol personnel and all individuals must be Legionaires to be eligible for membership.

Auxiliary duty includes work in all emergencies, road patrol 22. and various other special details designated by the detachment ommander of the natrol served by an auxiliary unit.





# **Weatherman Misses: Accredits Superior Forecasting Ability**


