

2nd ANNUAL PROJECT FAMILY PICNIC IS SET FOR AUG. 28

Plans are rapidly being completed for the second annual Project Family Picnic to be held at the Lucasville Fairgrounds on Saturday afternoon and evening, August 28, it has been announced by Luther F. Poling, chief of the PKS Recreation Division.

Last year an estimated 1,500 project employees and their families attended the gala event which is planned to be even bigger and better this year.

A few of the activities that

will take place during the afternoon and evening will include pony rides and swings for the kiddies, all types of contests with prizes for young and old, professional entertainment, free bingo party and a square dance.

Highlighting the colorful outing will be a giant "fireworks" display that evening. Also a championship softball game between winners of the three PKS Recreation Division leagues will be held as well as a project beauty contest.

Employees are urged to bring their own family picnic basket for the evening meal. Concession stands will also be open on the grounds. The Lucasville Fairgrounds are located on old U. S. Route 23, one mile north of Lucasville.

The project softball championship will be decided between the regular season winners from the Portsmouth, Jackson-Wellston and A-Plant Area Leagues. Plans call for one game to be played prior to August 28 to

decide the two finalists to play on the afternoon of the picnic.

The project beauty contest, held for the first time this year, will culminate with the crowning of "Miss Portsmouth Area". Attractive prizes will be awarded the winner and runner-up.

The contest is open to all female employees and dependents of employees associated with the Portsmouth Area project.

MEET THE MANAGEMENT:

Reynolds-Newbery Resident Manager Is 25-Year Veteran In Electrical Field

Synonymous with the word "electrical" on the Portsmouth area project is the name of Reynolds-Newbery, Joint Venture, principal subcontractors for the huge and complicated electrical installations required by the Atomic Energy Commission. This combination of forces of two prominent specialists in their field is headed by Resident Manager John S. Clark.

Clark brings a wealth of electrical know-how to this job. After receiving a B. S. degree in electrical engineering at the University of Illinois in 1930, he returned to New Mexico, where he had worked as an electrician for several mining companies during summer vacations. There he became chief electrician for the Phelps Dodge Mining Company.

In 1933 he accepted a job with Reynolds Electrical and Engineering Company in El Paso, Texas, as an estimator, and he went on to become executive vice president of that company. His important assignments included management of the company's operations in Hawaii, where he was stationed when the Japs bombed Pearl Harbor, and where he directed the replacement of bombed-out electrical installations.

An Army reserve lieutenant, he went on active duty in 1942 in the Asiatic theater for more than three years, and earned the rank of lieutenant-colonel.

Medical Division Chief Urges Cooperation On All Emergency Calls

An appeal to all project employees and supervisors has come from Dr. E. H. Stanley, chief of the PKS Medical Division, to give exact information when calling the project hospital for ambulance service anywhere on the jobsite.

Dr. Stanley said many persons were calling the hospital for ambulance service and failing to give the exact location inside buildings or the geographic location in the various areas.

Several weeks ago Dr. Stanley said the hospital dispatched three ambulances to the X-333 area as a result of four emergency calls to pick up the same injured person. Only one of the four calls gave the exact location of the injured employee.

"Two of our ambulances were still in the area searching for the injured employee after the third had brought the victim to the project hospital", said Dr. Stanley. Incidents of this type can be easily avoided if the caller will take the time to give the exact location where an ambulance is needed.

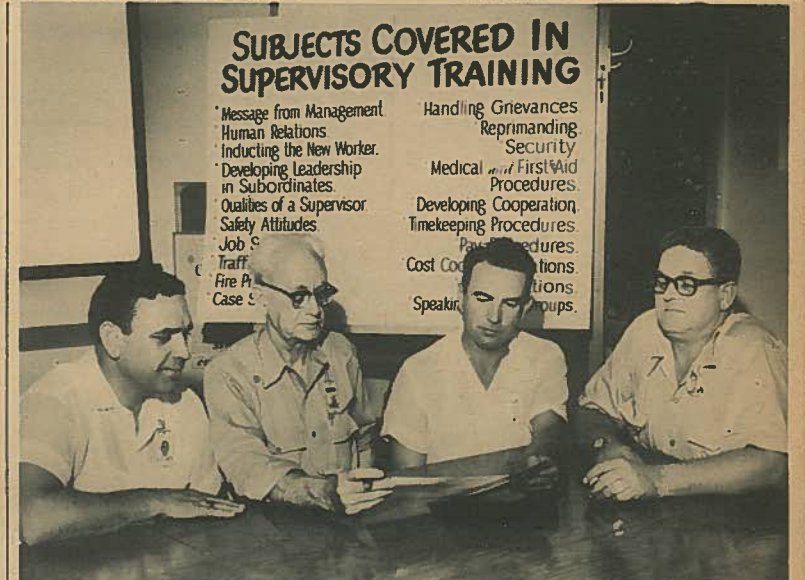

Informative "How" Book Published For PKS-CPFF Foremen On Project

Through the cooperation of supervisory training personnel of Peter Kiewit Sons' Co., Grinnell Corporation, Reynolds-Newbery Joint Venture and George Koch Sons, Inc., all foremen and general foremen on the job employed by the prime contractor and the three CPFF subcontractors will be supplied with a handy and informative Foreman's "How" Book.

The book, which will also take the place of the old foreman's time book, is a loose leaf type notebook with a blue leather binding. Heading the four-man committee for drawing up the book was Howard Cline of PKS. Other representatives included: V. P. "Vince" Connolly of Reynolds-Newbery, Bill Shelleda of Grinnell and J. H. "Jake" Frowine of George Koch.

Included in the book are condensed, easy to understand outlines of duties to be performed by all foremen on the job that have been taken from Standard Operating Procedures and Practices.

Contained in the foreman's "How" Book are such items as important phone listings, time book and sample time card, payroll and termination information, procedures to follow in case of accidents, information about government vehicles, tools

and clothing, outlines of general duties and an overall map of the area.

Neil Ekberg, chief of the PKS Indoctrination Branch, under whose supervision the Foreman's "How" Book was completed, said the book was designed to present the foremen with a brief but clearly understood version of problems which each foreman will be confronted with daily. Ekberg said he believed the book would make for more efficient operation in the field.

The "How" book will be kept current with any revision in policy or addition being inserted in loose leaf binder. Suggestions or comments on the book should be directed to any member of the four-man committee.

HAVE YOU MOVED LATELY?

There was a story in the June 25 issue of THE ATOMIZER that I hope all of you read because it ties very closely to your personal welfare and the welfare of your families.

In case you missed it, this article told of a project employee who "blacked out" on the job and was rushed to the hospital where he remained in a coma for three days. During that time, we were unable to locate his wife because he had failed to give us a change of address when he brought his family from their home in Tishomingo, Oklahoma to this area.

While cases as critical as this one may be rare, it does help us to realize that emergencies can and do arise that make it imperative that we have the current address of everyone on the job. In this instance, failure to notify us of an address change resulted in a great deal of needless mental anguish for the wife. There could be occasions when results would be even more serious.

If you have moved or there has been a change in residence of the person to be notified in case of emergency, we urge you to see your supervisor right away so that a Notification of Change of Address, PKS Form No. G-40, can be made out and become a part of your personnel folder.

Procurement Of Various Sheet Metal Items Is Task Of GKS Engineering Div.

Since April of 1953, when three employees made up the Engineering Division of George Koch Sons, Inc., on the Portsmouth Area project, the division has procured over 60,000,000 pounds of sheet metal items.

This tremendous poundage of sheet metal would furnish enough 24-gauge sheet metal to cover a highway 20 feet wide from the project to St. Louis, Missouri, or make a sheet metal pipe 12 inches in diameter that would reach approximately 2,000 miles.

The Engineering Division is an integral part of the GKS Engineering and Procurement Department. The division, headed by H. V. Black, is responsible for the procurement of all heating and ventilating duct work, air conditioning units, heating and ventilating equipment, and all sheet metal closures and structures for use at the Portsmouth Area A-plant.

The Engineering Division is also charged with the responsibility of processing drawings submitted by vendors for sheet metal work on the project. During the past 15 months the division has checked and approved for construction or fabrication several thousand shop drawings.

Two of the original three employees, Black and L. A. Kadel, still remain with the division some 15 months after its inception. The peak employment of the division saw a total of 63 employees. Of this group 13 were natives of the state of Ohio with the remaining number

representing 15 states and the territory of Hawaii. Seventeen of the Engineering Division personnel have been with the division for more than a year.

HOW TO GET OUT OF A BURNING BUILDING

Always be prepared for fire. When entering buildings, choose your nearest exit and alternate path of escape. Locked or obstructed exits or fire hazards should be reported.

Take no chances of entering a burning building to save property. Only the saving of lives justifies taking a personal risk. Leave the job of fire-fighting to firemen.

If fire breaks out and there is a panic-rush for the main exit, keep out of the crowd and attempt to find some other means of escape. Above all, keep calm!

If forced to remain in a smoke-filled building, remember that the air is usually better near the floor. If you must dash through smoke or flame, hold your breath.

A temporary refuge may be secured behind any door. Even a thin, wooden door will temporarily stop smoke and hot gases and may not burn through for several minutes.

Do not jump from upper-story windows except as a last resort. Many people have jumped to their death even when firemen were bringing ladders to rescue them.

ART THOMAS NEARS 25-YEAR MARK IN ACCIDENT PREVENTION SERVICE

For over two decades A. J. "Art" Thomas of Prattsville, Arkansas, has gone about the task of reducing the chances for injury and loss of life in the construction business. Art is senior safety engineer in charge of the Grinnell Corporation's safety program on the Portsmouth Area project.

One of Art's greatest thrills in the accident prevention crusade came here on the Portsmouth project when the Grinnell Corporation set a new national safety record for a mechanical contractor by completing 3,075,709 man-hours without sustaining a single lost-time accident.

While serving as safety director for the United Concrete Pipe Corporation at Baldwin Park, California, Thomas, along with Plant Superintendent Gordon Zane, was credited with bringing an end to one of the worst construction hazards of all time.

Thomas and Zane invented, patented and put into operation a fool-proof dielectric boom guard which made it possible for

cranes to work near high-tension electric wires without fatal results.

So great was the danger in California construction operations that the state made it unlawful for operators to swing cranes closer than six feet to a power line. Even this failed to stop the many accidental electrocutions. Not until Thomas and Zane invented their protective boom guard did the death rate drop sharply in this type of construction.

The Portsmouth Area job also resulted in a reunion for Thomas and Peter Kiewit Sons' Co. Safety Director J. F. "Joe" Madura. Art and Joe worked together for over five years in the safety programs at Davis Dam, Nevada, with Utah Construction and WHMS Construction at Camden, Arkansas. Madura was safety director on both of these operations.

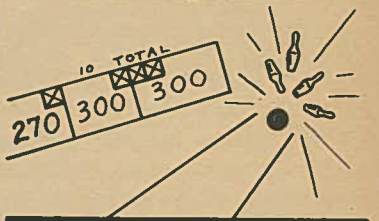

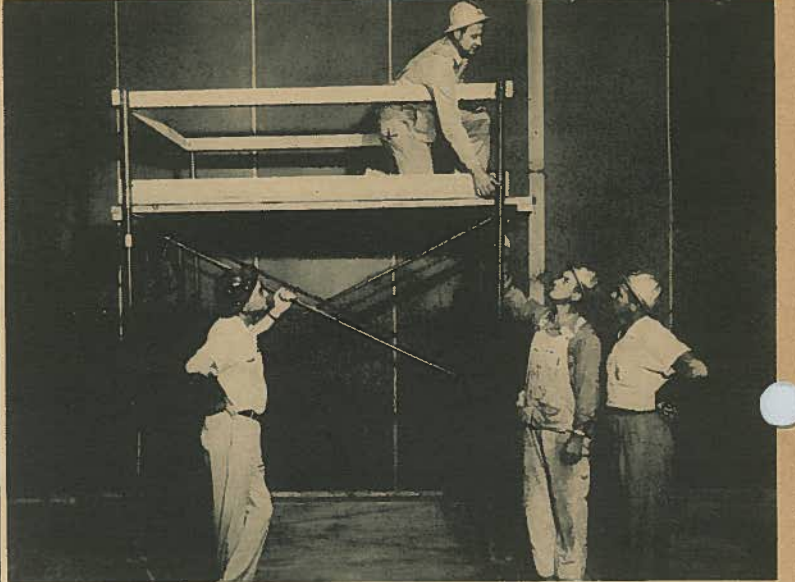
call use Extension 2104 or 104. Employees are reminded to use these numbers for emergency calls only. Other business calls to the project hospital should be made on Extension 2259.

It's a part of our American tradition to work together, to help the other fellow. This is as true today as it was in the time of the westward bound pioneers or as it was a few years ago in the great industrial effort of World War II.

You can call it teamwork, being a good neighbor, sportsmanship, or the buddy system — whatever you call it there's one thing for sure—it's the way to get things done smoothly and quickly. And it's the best way, too, to prevent accidents.

Teamwork for safety can and has pushed accidents down to an all time low on many jobs. All we have to do is think of the other fellow's safety as well as our own. It doesn't cost a cent and there's hardly any hardship involved—it's just a matter of good citizenship and good sportsmanship and good common sense.

Take the matter of safe driving. The really safe driver not only looks out for his own safety, but he makes sure he doesn't endanger the life of anyone else. We received a good example of
