NEWLY INSTALLED TRAFFIC CONTROLS IN USE ON PROJECT

Perimeter Access Gates To Jobsite Will Be Closed After Shift Changes

Through a recent directive issued by Peter Kiewit Sons' Co. General Manager George C. Holling, a series of traffic control barriers and a new schedule of hours effecting the use of the Peri-

went into effect Monday of this

"Complete cooperation of all employees is necessary if we are to obtain our objective through the use of these plans," said Mr. Holling.

In an effort to restrict traffic and out of the project at times other than normal shift hours, gates leading to the Perimeter Road will be open at the following hours only.

Gate Number 1 — Principal Access entrance over the Cloverleaf will remain open continuously 24 hours a day.

Gate Number 11-Administration Entrance from old U.S. Route 23 will be closed from 6:00 P. M. to 8:00 P. M. and from 9:30 P. M. to 5:30 A. M. Monday through Friday, and closed around the clock on Saturday, Sunday and holidays.

Gate Number 12-East entrance will be closed from 6:00 P. M. to 5:30 A. M. Monday through Friday and around the clock on Saturday, Sunday and holidays.

Gate Number 17—Southwest entrance to old U.S. Route 23 will be closed from 6:00 P. M. to 11:30 P. M. and from 2:00 A. M. to 5:30 A. M. Monday through Friday. This gate will also remain closed except be- P. M. tween the hours of 7:00 A. M.

meter entrances to the project and 5:00 P. M. on Saturday for scrap sales, and will be closed around the clock on Sunday and holidays.

> Gate Number 28-North entrance will be closed from 6:00 P. M. to 11:30 P. M. and from 2:00 A. M. to 5:30 A. M. Monday through Friday, and from 5:30 P. M. to 5:30 A. M. on Saturday, Sunday and holidays.

> Gate Number 39—Southeast entrance from Wakefield will be closed around the clock except from 6:00 to 8:30 A. M. and from 4:00 to 6:00 P. M. Monday through Friday.

> Employees working unusual hours are urged to make note of the gate or gates that will be open for their use. Signs with gate hours shown will be posted on all roads leading to and from all access entrances.

Another traffic control plan also went into effect this past Monday that is designed to curtail the heavy flow of traffic in the Construction Area during shift changes.

In an effort to eliminate the chance for injury to employees going to and from clock alleys, this plan will stop the flow of traffic traveling east and west across the Construction Area between the hours of 6:00 and 8:00 A. M. and 4:00 to 5:30


RED CROSS BLOOD UNIT TO VISIT SITE ON OCTOBER 19-20

Office Engineering Division's Work **Covers Many Phases Of Construction**

Another important link in the Peter Kiewit Sons' Co. organizational chain on the Portsmouth Area project is the Office Engineering Division of the Construction Engineering Department.

Heading the Office Engineering Division is Division Engineer Merrill Butler.

The Office Engineering Division is primarily responsible for providing the required office engineering services to accomplish the CPFF portion of construction, as well as to act as the engineering liaison for the Operations Unit with the Engineering and Procurement Unit and the Planning and Scheduling and Procurement Departments. To accomplish this work the Office Engineering Division is divided into Engineering, Plans and Specifications and Planning and Scheduling Branches.

The Engineering Branch consists of three sections. The Interference Section working in conjunction with representatives of the CPFF subcontractors assigned to this section, prepares interference and sleeve drawings for all electrical, mechanical, structural and architectural components of CPFF work.

The division's Permanent and Temporary Work Sections are responsible for providing construction engineering office services required by CPFF construction forces for all temporary and permanent work.

These sections are also responsible for performing, on a job-wide basis, the engineering functions required to insure the adequate supply of all tempor-

struction by CPFF forces. In conjunction with this task, this section conducts numerous studies to determine future construction needs as well as to determine what materials are no longer needed and can be made available for use on other AEC projects.

The Plans and Specifications Branch processes and files all department correspondence, assigned and unassigned subcontract documents, AE drawings, design drawings prepared by Construction Engineering forces, pare parts lists, operating manuals and maintenance manuals.

Making up the Planning and Scheduling Branch are the Cost Engineering and Scheduling and Reports Section. The Cost Engineering Section is responsible for cost coding, reviewing, analyzing and assembling cost data for all labor and material used by Peter Kiewit Sons' Co. and the CPFF subcontractors.

The Scheduling and Reports Section receives and reviews progress information and on the basis of this information, prepares narrative daily construction highlights and Weekly Progress Reports.

Possibly the most important phase of this section's work is the preparation, in conjunction with CPFF representatives assigned to the section, of all Short Term Construction Schedules



HEAVY CONSTRUCTION IS '54 PROJECT SOFTBALL CHAMI

PORTSMOUTH LEAGUE ENTRY COPS TITLE FOR 2nd STRAIGHT SEASO

A 2-1 win over the Grinnell Fitters at Portsmouth's Riverside Park last week gave the PKS Heavy Construction Division the project softball championship for the second straight year. The

victory over the Piketon League champions came on the heels of an 8-0 shut out by Heavy Construction of the Grinnell Operas, champions of the Jacksonellston League.

Again it was the brilliant pitching of Bill Newman, coupled with the timely hitting of Dick Hopkins, that paid off for Heavy Construction. Newman allowed Grinnell only two hits, while his mates collected six off loser "Dutch" Rankin.

The loss by Rankin was his second to Heavy Construction in the playoffs between the three PKS Recreation Division-sponsored leagues. Made eligible through a league rule for postason play, Rankin pitched for th Grinnell teams against the project champions.

Grinnell scored first in the final game when Harry Allman singled to lead off the second inning. Allman advanced to third on an error and an infield out and scored on a single by E. R. Ward.

Heavy Construction came back to tie the count in the fourth frame when Rankin walked Newman. An infield out moved Newman to second and he tallied on a sharp single to left by battery-mate Howard



> Selfishness—the "me first" attitude for lack of care or consideration for others, commonly referred to as discourtesy.

> Self-importance — the idea that "I'm too big for rules, they apply only to the other guy."

Over-confidence-"T'm good -I don't have to be careful-I know it all."

Chance-taking-the "live dangerously" concept, sometimes involving great faith in luck—"It can't happen to me."

Fatalistic attitude --- you go when your number is up and what you do doesn't make any difference.

Hostility—a constant, unfocused feeling of anger toward others, resulting in an attitude of aggression.

Attitude of inferiority — "I made by safety.

Competitiveness - trying to get ahead-to beat the other fel-

Unconscious self-destruction an attitude frequently noted by psychologists, a need to injure oneself.

Exhibitionism showing off. Pleasure in destruction— a personality maladjustment in which pleasure is derived from destroying things.

Transfer of guilt — creating situations in which blame can be placed on others, thus relieving feelings of guilt on the part of the instigator.

When we begin to understand the reasons why people have accidents then we are in a position to mobilize our energies for the purpose of discovering methods of changing those attitudes which draw people into acci-

Jolene Hogan Killed In Traffic Accident On Way To Project

The 17th traffic fatality involving construction personnel employed at the Portsmouth Area project since December of 1953 was recorded on September 30 when 26-year-old Jolene Hogan died as a result of injuries sustained in a one-car accident on State Route 104-17 near Jasper.

Miss Hogan was riding in a 1953 Chevrolet, driven by Barbara Hiland. The accident occurred at approximately 7:15 A. M. near the approach to the Piketon bridge at the intersection of Routes 104 and 124.

Officers of the Waverly Post of the Ohio State Highway Patrol said Miss Hiland's car, which was traveling north, apparently skidded on wet pavement, and left the west side of the highway and rolled down a 20-foot embankment into ar old canal bed. The automobi was damaged extensively.

Miss Hogan, who died as a result of a skull fracture, was taken to Portsmouth General Hospital where she was pronounced dead on arrival. Miss Hiland was released after treatment.

Both Miss Hogan and Miss Hiland were employed in the PKS Employment Division's Processing Section. Miss Hogan is a native of Portsmouth and had been employed on the Portsmouth project since November 11, 1952. She is survived by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Tom Hogan and her fiance, Ed Dillinger of Long Island, New York.
