SECRETARIES WEEK, 1975, has been announced in the following letter from the President of the United States, Gerald Ford.

"In the rush of our daily lives, there is much that becomes second nature, much that we unintentionally take for granted. Nothing is more second nature to the work of government and industry in this country than the efficiency of the secretary.

"It is most appropriate, therefore, that all across our country in every area of endeavor we set aside the week of April 20-26 to honor the nation's secretaries.

"Countless Americans daily express their understood trust in their secretaries. We charge them with many vital details, on which much of our success depends. At this time, we all have a perfect opportunity to recognize this fact and salute the accuracy, diligence and -- above all -- devotion of the American secretary."

CONTRACT NEGOTIATIONS with the Local OCAW Union have recently been requested as provided in Article XXI, Section 1, of the 1972 Contract. The first negotiation session between Company and Union officials was held March 18.

EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY at GAT has been successful to the extent that the employment of minorities rose from 55 on December 31, 1970 to 121 on December 31, 1974. In percentages, minorities represented 4.0% of total employment in 1970, and 6.4% in 1974. Female employment rose from 103 (7.5%) to 174 (9.2%) during the same period of time.

THE ECONOMIC ADVANTAGES of nuclear power are illustrated in the following examples:

- The one million customers of Northeast Utilities in Connecticut and Massachusetts received one-third of their electricity from nuclear power in 1972. Without that contribution Northeast would have had to burn an additional 12.1 million barrels of oil, at an increased fuel cost of \$140 million. The utility projects that nuclear power will provide 40% of its electricity in 1975.
- New Yorkers saved \$95 million because Consolidated Edison Co. generated 15% of its electricity with nuclear power. Con Ed estimates that nuclear power will save customers \$138 million in 1975.
- Florida Power & Light Co. saved its 1.7 million customers \$140 million last year because 22% of its electricity was produced by nuclear power.

A HEALTH NOTE from Dr. Albertowicz -- The chief sources of cholesterol in food are egg yolk, organ meats such as liver and kidney, butter, cheese and cream, and baked foods using egg yolks, butter and whole milk. Why do nutrition and medical experts urge us to lessen our intake of saturated fats and cholesterol? Because many studies have shown the saturated fats tend to build up thickness in the artery walls, cutting down on the blood supply to the heart, and possibly leading to heart attacks.
