MORE THAN 70% of all fires and fatalities due to fires in the home occur between 9 p.m. and 6 a.m., when most families are in bed. About 90% of the victims will die of asphyxiation and 60% will be asleep and never know what happened; 74% will die in a room untouched by flames.

THE INCREASINGLY FAVORABLE economics of nuclear power were illustrated recently in an Atomic Industrial Forum survey of about 20 U.S. utilities. Nuclear plants are producing electricity at approximately 40% less total cost--including amortized capital allocations--than fossil plants. One kilowatt of electricity generated by these utilities now costs an average of 10.52 mills when produced by nuclear power, compared with 17.03 mills when produced by oil or coal. In November alone, customers of Boston Edison Co. shared savings of more than \$8 million in fuel oil replacement costs, thanks to Pilgrim Nuclear Station. The unit operated for 667 hours in November and produced 396,427,000 Kwh, or 42.53% of Boston Edison's total system Kwh output. Pilgrim Station was available for service 92.6% of the time, achieving an 82.2% capacity factor.
