Contract Awards

William Cargile Contractor, Inc., Cincinnati, was awarded a contract for construction of plant facility security improvements including X-104 Building expansion for office and training space and construction of X-104A Firing Range at GDP. The contract was awarded following the company's bid of \$1.8 million.

Lillie-Hoffman Cooling Towers, Inc., St. Louis, has been awarded a contract for X-633-2A and X-633-2B cooling tower modifications at GDP. The contract was awarded based upon the company's bid of \$841,468.

Personal Finance

The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) has announced several taxpayer assistance programs. Through its Community Outreach Program, the IRS is offering free group assistance for the preparation of tax returns. It consists of group preparation (self-help) of federal income tax returns with sessions for 1040EZ, 1040A and 1040 at 96 sites throughout Southern Ohio. The sessions are available mainly on weeknights and Saturdays. Sites include locations in Chillicothe, Jackson, Waverly, Circleville, Hillsboro, Ironton, Gallipolis, West Union and Portsmouth. For additional site information, contact the IRS at 1-800-424-1040. No assistance is being provided with business returns such as Schedule C or F. Local libraries in Ohio are making available cassette tapes telling how to fill out federal income tax forms,

according to the IRS. These tapes are prepared by the IRS and contain line-by-line guidelines for completing Schedules A and B. These are the two most commonly used schedules on which taxpayers report itemized deductions and income from interest and dividends. For further information, call your local library. Tele-Tax is a new service through which taxpayers can receive recorded tax information on more than 100 topics listed in IRS Publication 910 "Taxpayer's Guide to IRS Information and Assistance", which includes explanations of IRS services, filing tips, recordkeeping information, amended returns, etc. Other types of services offered by the IRS include continuation of the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) and Tax Counseling for the Elderly (TCE) programs. The Problem Resolution Office can be reached at 1-800-424-1040 for taxpayers with problems which can't be handled through normal assistance channels.

News from DOE

Robert J. Hart, manager of the U. S. Department of Energy's Oak Ridge Operations (DOE-ORO), recently announced the appointment of Don A. Horsewood to a new management position within DOE-ORO. Horsewood has been named Deputy Assistant Manager for Administration, and will aid the Assistant Manager in responsibilities for the activities of five operating divisions: Organization and Personnel, Procurement and Contracts, Finance, Information Systems and Supply. The Office of Assistant Manager for Administration is also involved in local, state and federal relations. Horsewood was promoted from the position of director of the Organization and Personnel Division, his responsibility since 1973.

Martha O. Hesse, Assistant Secretary for Management and Administration with the Department of Energy in Washington, D. C., has been named the Source Selection Official for the selection of an organization to operate the four large DOE production, research and development facilities in Oak Ridge and Paducah. She will be responsible for making the contractor selection based on the findings of a Source Evaluation Board (SEB) which will review and evaluate proposals for operating the Oak Ridge Gaseous Diffusion Plant, the Oak Ridge Y-12 Plant, the Oak Ridge National Laboratory (ORNL) and the Paducah Gaseous Diffusion Plant. Hesse has named Peter D. Dayton, director of the Procurement and Contracts Division with DOE's Oak Ridge Operations Office, as chairman. Members of the SEB from DOE-ORO include Charles A. Keller, technical advisor to the manager; J. T. Milloway Jr., assistant manager, Construction and Engineering; and D. A. Horsewood, deputy assistant manager for administration. Victor L. Devers, chief, Weapons Branch, Quality Assurance Division, for DOE's Albuquerque (New Mexico) Operations Office also is a member of the SEB. The principal function of SEB is review and evaluation of proposals submitted to DOE by organizations seeking to operate the four facilities.

William A. Truex has been appointed Chief of the Industrial Personnel Branch within the Organization and Personnel Division of DOE's Oak Ridge Operations. His organization is responsible for developing and administering policies and procedures concerning DOE contractor personnel, labor relations and equal employment programs. The branch also assists in labor relations matters and participates in negotiation and administration of the personnel aspects of DOE contracts.

Robert E. Lynch has been appointed to the position of Deputy Director of the Procurement and Contracts Division with the DOE-ORO organization. Lynch will assist in the coordination of contractor selections, contract negotiations, procurement of goods and services, financial assistance agreements and approval of subcontracts, grants and cooperative agreements associated with the programs of Oak Ridge Operations which are carried out in a number of states and Puerto Rico.

William P. Snyder, Chief Counsel for DOE-ORO, is one of 10 DOE officials nationwide to receive Presidential "Meritorious Executive" awards for outstanding performance in federal energy programs. The honor is the second highest Presidential rank award made to eligible members of the Senior Executive Service which totals 6,500 throughout the federal government.

News from Goodyear

The Goodyear Tire & Rubber Company will invest more than \$50 million to build a plant on a 128-acre site near Asheboro, N. C., to produce steel wire cord to be used in radial tires. More than 350 jobs will be created by the time the plant reaches full production sometime early next year. The one-story building will cover more than 200,000 square feet. Goodyear said the plant will be operated using modern management methods and programs that help assure a cost-competitive quality product through directly involving employees in all phases of the production process. The plant manager will be Arthur L. Stube, who has been manager of the Decatur, Ala., textile mill, since 1976.

Motorists driving the streets of Springfield this winter didn't have to worry about road surfaces damaged by snowplow blades. The reason was that each of the city's 14 snowplows were equipped with rubber blades that removed ice and snow without gouging the pavement or tearing up manhole covers and water valves. Rubber snowplow blades are replacing traditional street blades in many cities because they are flexible as well as rugged. Goodyear notes that rubber blades adjust easily to roadway irregularities and glide over most obstructions, and are especially effective on roads with raised, reflective lane markers. The safety markers have long been popular in non-snow states but snow removal problems have impeded the growth of their use in snow-belt states. A study by the state of Washington recently showed that rubber blades wear less per mile of plowing than medium steel blades.
