### Nuclear Notes

The pace of licensing activity at the Nuclear Regulatory Commission is beginning to pick up in what is scheduled to be a banner year for new nuclear plants in the United States. In March, the NRC authorized licenses for Commonwealth Edison's LaSalle 2 to operate at full power and for Susquehanna 2 in Pennsylvania to start up and begin testing at up to five percent power. Susquehanna 2 is owned jointly by Pennsylvania Power and Light Co. and Allegheny Electric Cooperative. These two licenses were quickly followed in early April with a full-power operating license for the Washington Public Power Supply System's Unit 2 reactor and a start-up license for Pacific Gas & Electric Co.'s Diablo Canyon Unit 1 reactor in California. Diablo Canyon 1 was the 19th nuclear plant to receive start-up permission since the Three Mile Island accident. Shelby Brewer, the Department of Energy's assistant secretary for nuclear energy, has predicted that 21 new nuclear plants, totaling 23,000 MWe, would come on line between now and the end of 1985, more than the nuclear generating capacity existing today in all of Japan.

Twenty new nuclear power plants went into service in ten foreign countries in 1983, boosting installed nuclear capacity outside the U. S. 15 percent to 120,823 MWe. New power reactors went into operation in France (five); the Soviet Union (four); Canada, South Korea and Spain (two each); and Argentina, Belgium, Hungary, Sweden and India (one each). Nuclear power produced 10 percent of the world's electricity last year (including the U. S.), and it was cheaper than coal-fired or oil-fired power in Japan, France and the United Kingdom. Six new nuclear plants were ordered outside the U. S. last year -- four in France and two in Japan.

News from DOE

The Department of Energy has announced the appointment of C. Ray Somerlock as project manager for the Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR), a national petroleum storage project in the Texas and Louisiana Gulf Coast area. DOE'S Oak Ridge Operations Office is responsible for SPR management and operation. Somerlock, deputy project manager for the past 2 1/2 years, replaces Curtis Johnson who has transferred to Oak Ridge. More than 390 million barrels of oil are stored in the Reserve, moving toward a storage capacity of 750 million barrels by 1991. The oil is stored in underground caverns mined in salt domes along the Gulf Coast.

News from Goodyear

Goodyear directors May 8 declared a regular quarterly dividend of 35 cents per share payable June 15 to shareholders of record May 16. The dividend payment represents an annual rate of \$1.40 a share.

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
